FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

Selecting Hatching Eggs.—Pay some attention to the size, shape and color of the eggs used for hatching purposes and in future years your flock will produce eggs which will command a premium price on the market.

Care of Batteries.—Keep the automobile and light plant batteries filled with distilled water. Exposed plates deteriorate rapidly and the wood separators dry out, crack and warp when exposed to the air. The storage batteries should be charged to 1260 to 1300. The plates of a discharged battery will harden if left uncharged. Keep the battery terminals covered with vaseline to prevent attack by sulphuric acid.

Fertilizer for the Garden.—Manure is the best garden fertilizer supplemented with chemical fertilizers. About 150 to 200 pounds of manure per square rod spaded or plowed under plus eight pounds of acid phosphate broadcast and raked in is a good method of making your garden produce. If manure is scarce, use less and apply 10 to 12 pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 4-8-4 per square rod.

Care of Horses' Feet.—Roads that are frozen rough are extremely hard on horses' feet. For heavy hauling, the feet should be protected by a good set of well-fitted shoes. Untrimmed hoofs break off, making the feet sore and the result is lameness. A rasp, a paring knife and a pair of pincers will do for ordinary hoof trimming.

Overheated Chimneys.—The chimney ought to be examined at this time of the year. Overheated chimneys cause many of the too frequent fires in the country.

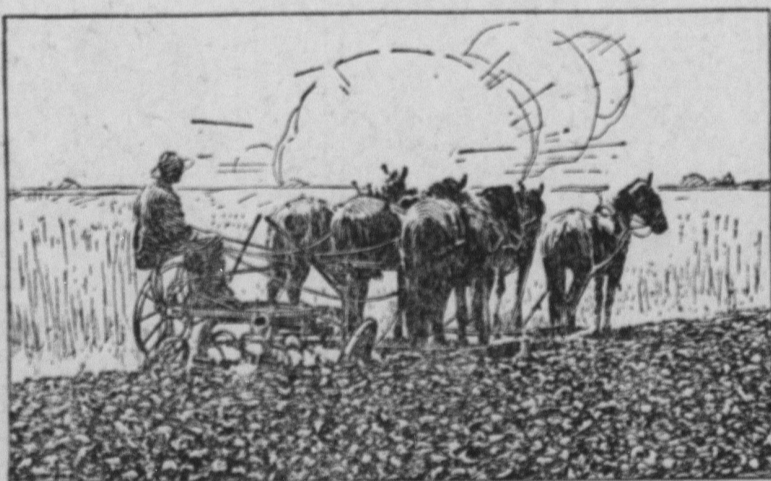
