walk or floor is laid, cover it with dirt be sold the following household goods. or manure and keep it moist several days. This will prevent rapid evaporation of water and results in a better piece of work. . Use a wood float instead of a steel trowel to smooth down the concrete surface. A steel trowel makes the surface too smooth and slippery.

Poultry Parasites-If your birds become thin or lose control of their legs, it may be caused by the presence of round worms or tape worms in the intestines. Hold a post-mortem examination and if the parasites are present. treat the flock with nicotine sulphate capsules. Treat each bird individually by fitting a capsule into the end of a piece of rubber tubing, pushing the tubing down into the bird's crop, and then ejecting the capsule by means of a wire plunger. Follow this treatment the next day by dosing the flock with Epsom salts at the rate of one pound per hundred birds.

Varieties of Soybeans For hay, a medium season, large growing , bean, such as the Wilson. Virginia or Ohio 9035, is recommended. Early warieties such as Ito San and Manchu will not give large yields. For the northern half of Pennsylvania. Elton is a good variety and is a little earlier than the Wilson. The large late varieties such as the Mammoth Yellow are too coarse and late in maturing for best results.

Growing Asparagus Asparagus is the earliest green vegetable the garden can produce. Every home garden should have an asparagus bed.
