The Spiker stone quarry, at Centre Hall, was notified a few days ago to discontinue the shipment of stones to the various furnaces it supplied. Fifteen to twenty men had been employed. It is not known how long the orders will be withheld.

Mrs. W. V. Godshall took advantage of the recent Washington excursion to visit her daughter, Miss Edna Bailey, who is a student in a Methodist school in the National capital preparing herself for missionary work.

Fifty prisoners from the Eastern penitentiary, at Philadelphia, were brought to the Western pen at Rockview, on Tuesday. They came up over the branch in a separate coach and were all togged up in gray suits and caps.

J. W. Zang, assistant principal of the Hubbersburg High school, was in town on Tuesday making arrangements for bringing the play, "Six Sharps and One Flat" to Centre Hall this coming Saturday evening. See display advertisement in another column.

Word has been sent out by the State bureau of fire protection that radios equipped with outside antenna should have lightning arresters installed. This addition will make for the safety of the buildings in case of electric storms. An arrester like that used on telephone wires may be used.

Breen complained of feeling ill, and on going a short distance farther down the Earlystown road, he collapsed, having received a paralytic stroke. He was brought on to town where Dr. Longwell was summoned. Mr. Breen was conscious much of the time until Tuesday morning, when he rallied and was able to speak, although his condition continues very serious.

The Veteran Employees Association will hold its annual meeting at Niagara Falls, Saturday, May 17th. This association is made up of Pennsylvania Railroad employees who have been in the service twenty years and over. The Reporter, on Monday morning, was pleased to have a call from T. C. Harbeson, State Forester at Milroy, who was here in the interest of the forestry department. Mr. Harbeson will have charge of the nursery work at Rockview, where eight and one-half acres will be devoted to the growing of forest trees from seed and seedlings. Three acres will be given over to trees grown from seed and the remainder of the plot to weak seedlings from other nurseries that need transplanting before fit to send out to reforest the waste lands. Of course, the work at the nursery will be done by prisoners, and these will be in charge of Matthew Goheen, of Boalsburg.

DEATHS.

KRAPE.—Ada Jane Krape, wife of Alfred P. Krape, died in the Geisinger Memorial Hospital, Danville, Friday morning, to which institution she had been taken six months previous. Mrs. Krape had never been ill of any consequence prior to two days before she entered the hospital. At that time she struck her breast on a table in stooping and suffered violent pain as a consequence. Upon examination at the hospital it was found that cancer had a deep hold, which the two operations that followed failed to give relief.

The body was shipped here Friday evening and Monday afternoon the funeral was held from the Krape home, Rev. Delas R. Keener, pastor of the Reformed church, officiating, and Rev. J. M. Kirkpatrick, of the Presbyterian church, assisting. Interment was made in the family plot at Centre Hall by the sides of her two daughters.

Mrs. Krape was the daughter of George and Sabina (Shellenberg) Durst and was born near Centre Hall, April 24, 1863, making her age eight days over sixty-one years. There survive her husband and one daughter, Mrs. Harry C. Reish, of Centre Hall; also a brother, Howard W. Durst, of the same place.

Mrs. Krape was a member of the Reformed church from youth, and was a kind, industrious woman whose chief aim was for her home and those in it.

MOWERY.—Mrs. Henrietta Mowery, widow of James Mowery, died in Patton, on Tuesday. The body will be brought to Centre Hall and interment made here on Friday.

Mrs. Mowery was the daughter of A. Green Carter, and was born at State College. Her age was 71 years. She had been ill for about three weeks from pneumonia. There survive her two children—John Mowery, Centre Hall, and a daughter, Maude, in Huston, Texas. Frederick K. Carter, of Centre Hall, is a brother, the only member of the Carter family surviving.

LUCAS.—Willard Roy Lucas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. H. Lucas, died at St. Joseph's Hospital, Joliet, Ill., April 28, aged 12 years, 4 mo. and 11 days.

He had the measles, and was recovering from them when peritonitis developed. An operation was performed Saturday night, but he failed to respond, and he passed away at 8:15 Monday morning. He was laid to rest in the cemetery at Wilton Centre, Rev. Van Evers of the U. E. officiating.

He leaves to mourn, his parents and an only brother, David W., and a host of friends.

No Graduating Exercises This Year.

There will be no graduating exercises of the senior class of the Centre Hall High school this year. It so happens that the senior class this year was the senior class in 1923, at which time the class was graduated in formal manner. The addition of the fourth year to the course this year returned last year's "graduates" to school for another year, and graduating exercises were deemed unnecessary.

Reformed Missionary Convention.

The twenty-third annual convention of the Woman's Missionary Society of the West Susquehanna Classis of the Reformed church met at McClure, Snyder county, Wednesday and Thursday of last week. The delegates from Centre Hall who attended were Mrs. C. W. Booser and Mrs. W. F. Bradford. Mrs. P. M. Fisher, representing the Girls Missionary Guild, was also present; also Mrs. J. B. White, of State College.

The receipts for the year from the various sources totaled 1,867.29, all of which except \$21.12 was expended. The sums contributed by societies in Centre county were as follows: Aaronsburg, \$52.48; Bellefonte, \$98.56; Centre Hall, \$119.46; Howard, \$47; State College, \$69.68.

BIG CONVENTION OF EAGLES.

Three-Day Session in Williamsport on June 16-18—Fully 5,000 Persons Expected.

The program for the state convention of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, to be held in Williamsport on June 16, 17 and 18, has been announced.

The new home of the Williamsport Aerie, No. 970, at the northeast corner of Basin and East Third streets, will be occupied at the time of the convention. All of the interior work, except the decorating, has been completed and it is expected the decorators will finish their work within two weeks. The Aerie expects to move into the new home about May 15.

The convention is expected to bring at least 5,000 people to the city. Prizes are to go to the best drill team in competitive drill; the Aerie coming the longest distance with the largest number of men in line; the Aerie with the greatest number of men in line of march regardless of the distance traveled; the tallest Eagle in the line of march; the smallest Eagle in the line of march; \$50 in cash to the band with the largest number of men in line and \$50 in cash to the band coming the longest distance.

There will be a continuous vaudeville and cabaret show at the Eagles home on all days of the convention. An old time pension picture will be shown at Keeney's theatre and complimentary tickets will be given to visiting delegates and their friends. There will be automobile tours, street carnival and block party on Mulberry street from East Third street to East Fourth St.

Program for Each Day.

The program for each day is as follows:

Monday—registration and reception of delegates at club house. At 8 o'clock in the evening the State Aerie will be opened. The evening address will be made by Conrad H. Mann, on the subject "Eagledom," address of welcome and presentation of the key of the city. Mayor Hugh Gilmore; reply to address of welcome, V. Walter Slattery, of Allegheny Aerie. No. 827, state president. Special musical entertainment will be provided.

Tuesday—Session State Aerie, street parade at 3 o'clock in afternoon. Ritualistic contest at 8 o'clock in the evening at Aerie home.

Wednesday—closing session of State Aerie, old fashioned picnic at Turner's cottage on Loyalsock with athletic games and sport contests. In the evening there will be a ball at the Knights of Columbus ball room. The convention headquarters will be at The Lycoming.
