Eddie Hearne to Race at Altoona.
Champion Eddie Hearne, the biggest figure in the year's racing, this week signed up for the big 250-mile international classic to be held on the great speedway at Altoona, Saturday, June 14. With Hearne entered, the "big four" of the sport—Hearne, Milton, Murphy and Fenger—top the list of those who will face the starter's flag. "Grandpa" Hearne, the veteran of the sport, although only 38 years old, comes to Altoona as the victor in the first big classic raced there last Labor Day, when the track was opened to the public. Driving the 200-mile grind without a stop last September, he distanced the fast field when his skill at nursing his roaring car at 114 miles an hour kept him from out of the pits throughout the contest when more spectacular pilots were forced in several times, losing precious seconds, by lubrication and ignition troubles.

One of the most outstanding proofs of Eddie's nerve as a champion driver was given at this inaugural race at Altoona. Flying into the first turn out of the home stretch at a gait close to 117 miles an hour, he witnessed the spectacular spill of "Howdy" Wilcox, in which the great Hoosier pilot was killed, and careened his car within a few inches of the top guard rail to escape the hurtling wreck. Although "Howdy" was a lifelong friend, Eddie followed the rules of the game in surging over the remaining laps, but broke into tears when he was given the coveted checkered flag instead of smiling the smile of a winner.

Eddie declared during 1923 that if he could only attain championship laurels he would retire, but no fear was felt that the present season wouldn't see him on the track. The odor of the exhaust "custer" and the cannonade of cars in early tuning have brought him back, as race men knew would happen.

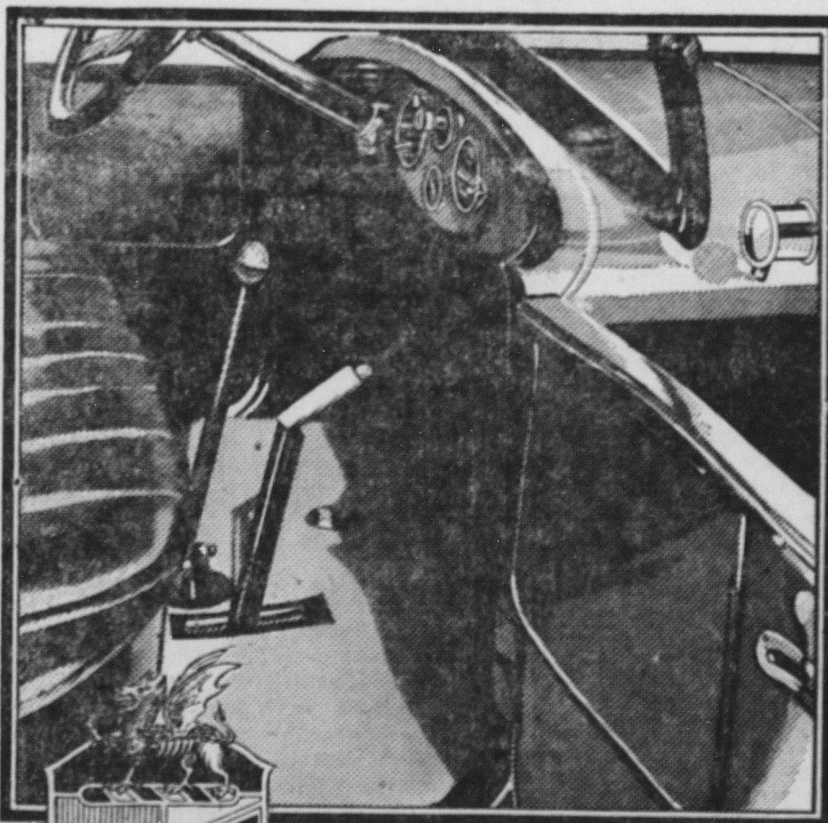
