

HOME HINTS AND DIET

By INEZ SEARLES WILLSON

BRAISING

Braising is an economical and palatable way of cooking some of the tougher cuts of meat and it is a method not as frequently employed in the home as it should be. The less expensive cuts of the animal are richer in nutritive value than the more costly steaks and chops and the question, of cooking them to render them tender and to develop the flavor is one to which the good cook knows the an-

Unless properly done, braising is nothing more than stewing. It is, correctly speaking, a combination of roasting and stewing and often frying as well. The meat is cooked on a bed of vegetables from which it derives

The vegetables, consisting of carrots, onlons, turnips and celery, are cut in fine pieces. They may be fried gently in ham fat.

The meat is browned well on all sides to keep in the extractives. It is then placed on top of the vegetables in a pan with a tight-fitting lid. The seasoning is added and also a pint of hot water or, better, of soup stock.

The cooking may now be finished in any one of several ways. It may be continued on top of the stove, although, strictly speaking, in braising heat should be applied from all sides. For cooking on top of the stove, the Dutch oven, that iron pot with a lid. is the ideal utensil to use. Every family of any size should have a Dutch oven. They are handy for so many things.

The braising may be completed in the oven where it is allowed to cook slowly for several hours or until the meat is tender. More liquid will need to be added from time to time.

The fireless cooker may be used with excellent results in this method a fair question an' I'll gie 'ee a fait of cookery. A cupful of liquid will be sufficient to add in the first place as less evaporation takes place than in any other method. This is a good way to use it if one wishes to go out and let the ment cook itself. Simply put it in the fireless cooker and forget it until Ginner time.

We are apt to associate braising with the tougher cuts of beef only. Calf's tongue and heart, boned shoulder of mutton and veal and chicken may be well-cooked in this way

Any meat cooked after this fashion is a very savory dish. It is another means of yarying the meals and every housekeeper welcomes a new way to answer the old question of "what shall we ent?"

CLASSIFICATION OF TEXTILE FABRICS

The value of fibers for textile purposes depends upon them possessing properties which make it possible to spin them into varn or thread.

Wool has a short staple (length of fiber) but it is covered with tiny scales which lock together in the process of spinning, making a very strong yarn

There are certain fibers found in asture, such as the "silk" from the milk-weed pod, which do not possess this property, and so they are useless to the textile industry under the present methods of manufacture.

Silk has a very long fiber, so long. in fact, that it is not spun but reeled instead. The waste silk only is spun, and is used for making cheaper grades of silk materials. Silk is the strongest textile fiber, and for this reason it is used in many scientific experiments. and during the war it was used for cartridge cloth. Waste silk comes from the outside of the cocoon and from pierced cocoons, those from which the moth is allowed to break its way out. For reeled silk it is necessary to destroy the chrysalis before the moth is ready to come out. The cocoons intended for reproduction are allowed to reach full maturity.

Linen has a long fiber, and while the preliminary processes necessary to get it into condition to spin are difficult, it can be made into strong thread. Incidentally, the difficulties attendant upon preparation for spinning are one of the reasons for the

high cost of linen. There are certain artificial fibers which play a more or less important part in the industrial world. Asbestos, spun glass and artificial silk are under this head. Asbestos is importent because it is a fireproof material and so is used extensively for theater curtains and as covering for pines. Spun glass is used for ornaments. Just at present there is a vogue for glass bracelets. It is also used in the industrial arts. Artificial silk is a sub- Exchange. stitute for real silk, and it is manufactured from cellulose of some kind, such as wood pulp.

The minor fabrics are hemp, jute and ramie. The first two are used for ropes and gunny sacking. Ramie is a fiber which resembles linen, but it is so difficult to handle that the manufacture of it has not progressed very

Tides Used for Power

With the claim that it is the first to use the tides successfully in the generation of electricity, a hydroelectric plant employing this principle has been set up at East Saugus, near Lynn, Mass. The plant, which is the invenwas begun two years ago and was completed and put in operation early in the present year. It consists of a small power house above a well on an arm of the Saugus river, in which is a turbine set in motion by the ebb and flow of the tide. About 65 horse power is generated by a dynamo rigged to the turbine, says the New York Times. The plant was financed largely by Italian residents of Massachusetts.
