**Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus at Lock Haven.**

The day when persons living a few miles from a city in which a notable event was to take place, could not attend without enduring hardships and inconveniences is past and with the advent of the automobile, good roads and efficient train service, it is only a matter of an hour's pleasant ride to the city where one may take part in the pleasures which are offered.

The Hagenbeck-Wallace circus will attest to the statement that more persons in the outlying districts attend its performances each season and a careful tab is kept on all out-of-town visitors because this circus takes pains to cater to the person who travels miles to witness its performances.

Circuses, it must be understood, can not make every city in a state in one season and sometimes it is a few years before the circus returns to a particular city, as other towns are anxiously awaiting its coming. Therefore, with this in mind the Hagenbeck-Wallace circus each year selects its route so as to make it convenient for the most people to travel to see it.

The idea of persons in nearby cities making up what they call "circus parties" and attending the show in a body is rapidly gaining favor each year. It has been found, and in many cases those who do not own automobiles form a small party and charter a car for the day.

The Hagenbeck-Wallace circus with its two menageries of trained wild animals augmented by several scores of domestic animals, and its 450 performers is scheduled to present an afternoon and evening performance in Lock Haven on Saturday, June 21, in addition to a free street parade, more than one mile in length at 10:30 a. m. The wild animal acts, as usual are featured on the 1924 tour, but the acts have been enlarged to include almost every species of jungle beasts who can be taught to perform.

Wild animal acts will take up one hour of the performance and the aerial, equestrian and hippodrome exhibitions will consume the other half, making a well balanced program.

On circus day a ticket office will be opened downtown at the Hilton & Helpan drug store and at this place visitors may purchase tickets for either performance. No additional charge is made for this convenience and the same prices as are charged on the circus grounds will prevail.

A movement has been started by the Merchants' Retail Association of Lewisburg to secure a tourist camp in or near that town. Philipsburg has already such an accommodation at a point known as the Midway pleasure resort between Philipsburg and Osceola Mills, on the Lakes to the Sea highway.

**Spraying Potatoes**—Over 23,000 acres of potatoes were sprayed in the state last year. This is good proof that the practice is profitable. If you are not familiar with the methods and materials to use, consult your county agent.

**Feeding Horses**—Pasture is a valuable and appetizing feed for horses, whether idle or working. Alone it is not sufficient for horses at work, but should be supplemented with hay and grain rations relatively high in protein.

**Care of the Eggs**—Keep the nests clean and on rainy days do not allow the birds to run out of doors until 11 in the morning. Most of the eggs will be laid by this time. Provide one nest for every four hens so that crowding will be reduced to a minimum. Gather the eggs twice daily during the sum-

mer months and keep them in a cool dry place. Market the eggs at least twice a week. Sell, kill or confine all male birds as soon as the hatching season is over.

**Insect Control**—Twig injury from the oriental peach moth is showing up in some orchards. The moths are still coming out and laying their eggs. If any twig injury is showing up in your orchard, it will pay to make another application of spray sometime this week. Be sure and put nicotine in the cluster appld spray to control the rosy aphids and the apple red bug. If this has not been done and the rosy aphids is present, make another application, using nicotine and soap in the usual proportions. Get underneath the tree and soak the foliage from the under side.

**Growing Dairy Calves**—During the summer months dairy calves over six months old can be kept on pasture. When the pastures become short, they should have some hay and grain. A good grain mixture consists of corn meal 500 pounds, oats 200 pounds, bran 200 pounds, and oil meal 100 pounds.
