**Expect 2000 at Penn State Summer Session.**

School teachers from every county in Pennsylvania and many from outside the state will be welcomed to the campus of the Pennsylvania State College next Saturday, registration day for the fifteenth annual summer session. Classes will begin Monday, July 7, and continue for six weeks. Dean Will Grant Chambers has announced that all is in readiness for the enrollment of 2000 or more summer students.

Penn State will have two branch summer sessions this year, it is announced, one in Altoona and the other in Erie. The Erie session opened on Monday of this week, while the Altoona branch will open July 7 and parallel the regular session at the college. Approximately 100 teachers will receive instruction at each of these branches.

**"Earned Income" Preferred.**

No feature of the federal revenue bill is more justifiable than the favor it shows to "earned income" as against income from inherited or invested wealth. A deduction of 25 per cent. of the tax on net income can be made, for this reason, after the tax has been figured at the reduced rates.

This means that the man actually hustling for a living will pay only three-fourths as much income tax on his wages, salary or professional fees as will the man deriving an income of the same size from some other source. There is an interesting exception, however. It is provided that any net income of \$5,000 or less will be regarded as having been "earned." This is favoritism shown to small investors, dependents, etc. at the expense of the wealthy "coupon clippers," and is probably defensible on broad social and economic grounds. It avoids laying a tax burden on the person whose only means of livelihood is a pension and it encourages people of moderate means to invest their savings.

This favor to earned income is a new principle in America, but has long been practiced in foreign countries which have income taxes.
