10,419 PUPILS ATTEND SCHOOLS IN CENTRE COUNTY.

Especially Interesting Statistics Presented by Assistant Superintendent Rothrock.

The annual report of Assistant County Superintendent of Schools H. C. Rothrock, which was filed last week, shows by statistics some especially interesting features of the school year just ended in Centre county.

Of outstanding interest is the fact as shown by the report, that during the past year the number of pupils attending the public schools in the county, including both High schools and grades, was 10,419. Of this number, 8,963 pupils attended the grade schools, and 1,456 were enrolled in High schools.

Looking after the education of this great army of Centre county young folks were 334 teachers, classified as follows:

High schools, first class, 39; second class, 4; third class, 8.
Special teachers—art, 1; music, 3.
Grades, 22.
Special teachers in grade work, 2.
Rural schools, 229.
Departmental work, 23.
Supervising principals, 3.
Total number of male teachers, 96.
Total number of female teachers, 238.
The number of pupils attending the six first-class High schools in the county follows: Bellefonte, 344; Centre Hall, 66; Gregg Township Vocational, 69; Millheim, 49; Philipsburg, 357; State College, 268. Total, 1,153.
Second class High schools, pupils attending numbered: Walker township, 41; Harris township, 39; total, 71.
Third-class High schools, pupils attending numbered: Haines township, 16; Howard borough, 38; Liberty township, 28; Miles township, 17; Milesburg borough, 27; Snow Shoe borough, 45; Spring township, 36; Worth township, 25; total, 232.

Of the 31 male and 42 female teachers engaged in various classes of High schools in the county, those holding college diplomas numbered 37, those having Normal School certificates numbered 6; holding permanent certificates, 5; holding special, or other, certificates, 7.

It is interesting to note how the 8,963 grades pupils were divided among the boroughs and townships throughout the county. Rush township had, by far, the greatest number of children in attendance in grade schools of any borough or other township in Centre county, the total being 1,177. Philipsburg borough ranked second, with 745. Snow Shoe township was third, with 688, taking rank over Bellefonte borough, with 641; Spring township, with 616, and State College, with 448.

The following table enables the reader to appreciate how many grades schools children, as well as teachers, were there in Centre county during the past year, as shown by the enrollment records:

1800 Dimes Saved By Woman In Year

Cedar Rapids, July 8—A year ago one of the local national banks made an appeal to its depositors to save their dimes. It stressed the point that thousands of dimes were foolishly spent each year because a dime was such a small coin and seemingly valueless. It urged its depositors to make 90 cents do the work of every dollar and deposit the other dime in a savings account.

The idea "took." Scores of savings accounts were started and "thin" dimes became as popular as hard dollars. Now the bank is telling of the success of the plan. It points to one woman who has a savings account of \$180, all of which she saved in one year from dimes, money she originally would have spent and thought nothing about if not considered herself any poorer.
