Machines Waste Valuable Grain

Loss of Time and Money Prevented by Good Care of Thresher.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

If a man in New York were to buy a ticket for San Francisco and then walk to Chicago before boarding the train you would think him foolish indeed. Yet, is not the farmer who plows his fields and sows his grain, cares for it through the long summer and carefully harvests the crops, only upon threshing the bundles of loaded grain, to blow a large part of it over into the straw pile, liable to the same accusation? Inefficient operation of threshing machines is responsible for a great many bushels of wasted grain, says the United States Department of Agriculture.

Time and Grain Lost.

Any standard threshing machine will do its work with very little waste of grain or loss of time, if kept in good condition, adjusted properly for the particular job on which it is engaged, furnished with the proper amount of power applied correctly and watched intelligently while in operation. Nevertheless, it is true that a great amount of time is lost and a large amount of grain wasted unnecessarily in threshing.

All thresher manufacturers have endeavored to make their machines as efficient as possible and the construction such that they will give a minimum of trouble. However, there are so many parts to a threshing machine, and it must work under such a wide range of conditions, that numerous adjustments must be left for the operator to make in the field, and careful attention is required for its successful operation.

If a machine fails to separate all of the grain from the straw it is usually due to one or more of the following causes: (1) The machine is not being run at its proper speed, (2) the cylinder fails to thresh all of the kernels out of the heads, (3) the separating mechanism is not level, or (4) the blast is not adjusted properly.

Crop Owner Interested.

Naturally the thresherman is not so vitally concerned in getting every bushel of grain from the straw as is the crop owner, because it only means two or three cents to him for each bushel saved, whereas to the crop owner it means the price of the entire bushel, a matter of 50 or 60 cents, or more, depending upon the kind of grain being threshed and the price of it on the market. The crop owner, therefore, should be versed in the operation of the machine and at least know whether the separator man has his machine adjusted for the most efficient results possible.

Farmers' Bulletin 691, issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, has been written for the information of farmers who have grain threshing to do, and discusses the various points to watch in the efficient operation of the threshing machine. Three Great Objects of Cultivation Discussed

In urging the proper tilling of the soil, the New York State College of Agriculture points out that cultivation has three main objects: Killing weeds, loosening the soil and saving moisture; further, this is said to be probably the order of their importance.

Weeds must be kept down and the earlier they are disturbed after germination the easier they are killed. The critical time is the period between planting and the time when the crop is large enough to cultivate without covering the plants.

For corn and potatoes, the tillage with the harrow or weeder is likely to be the making of the crop so far as cultivation is concerned. The start the crop gets on the weeds is likely to be maintained, especially in the rows.

Assuming good fitting of the soil and a reasonably good till, two inches is the maximum depth of cultivation desirable. Greater depth is likely to stimulate weeds by bringing up more seeds.

Make Good Fly Sprays

Solutions of any of the standard coal tar dips make good fly sprays. Add fish oil and whale oil to prevent the hair from becoming harsh or rough. A formula for making this fly spray is the following:

5 pints coal tar dip 5 pints whale oil
5 pints fish oil 5 pints oil of tar
5 pints coal oil

Dissolve three pounds of laundry soap in water, add the above materials. Add lukewarm soft water to make 30 gallons.

Spray for Potato Beetle

The Colorado potato beetle is controlled by spraying with 2 pounds of powdered arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water. This spray should be put on when the insects first appear. The various worms that feed on the leaves of cabbage can also be controlled by this spray.

Growing Chinese Cabbage

Chinese cabbage is best planted in August when the soil is more suitable to its growth and it will furnish an abundant supply of greens for salad until killed by freezing weather. It may also be used for cold slaw or cooked like cabbage or greens.

Propagating Plants by Use of Cuttings

Frame Which Uses Sunlight as Source of Heat Is Good.

The propagation of plants by the use of cuttings is one of the oldest methods known, and until recently it was considered necessary for the best results that the rooting work should be carried on in a well-equipped greenhouse, using steam coils to supply bottom heat. The lack of such equipment, however, and the expense of providing it, have been serious objections to any widespread use of vegetative propagation except with plants easily rooted out of doors. This has been overcome to a considerable extent by the development by the United States Department of Agriculture of a propagating frame which uses sunlight as a source of bottom heat. It has been found to give excellent results, with the plants experimented with, including most of the standard citrus root stocks, as well as the newer hybrids.

The method and the experimental results are described in Department Circular 310, "The Solar Propagating Frame for Rooting Citrus and Other Subtropical Plants," just issued. The construction of the frame is simple and the method is economical and offers considerable promise for other groups of plants, especially of subtropical character. The use of the solar rooting frame is obviously best adapted to the warmer portions of the country having a relatively large amount of sunshine.

Nicotine Dust Is Used in Killing Plant Lice

Nicotine dust is the substance recommended by the college of agriculture at New Brunswick for controlling the aphids which are so abundant on vegetable crops throughout New Jersey this year.

To prove the effectiveness of this substance in killing the pest a demonstration was conducted June 3 on the farm of William Hookstra, Beverly, N. J. Dust containing 3 per cent nicotine was applied with a power duster. The next day an examination showed that the killing was nearly 100 per cent.

The dust is easily applied, and as this and other trials have shown, it is thorough in its work. Application should be made after the dew is off and when the sun is shining brightly. Since the aphids are usually concealed beneath the leaves, considerable force should be used in applying the dust.

A one-horse two-row duster that will go through spaces six inches wide between the rows has just been placed on the market. This is particularly adapted to applying nicotine dust.

Growers of peas, beans, early celery, cabbage, spinach, lettuce, tomatoes, eggplant, and peppers must use increased vigilance and care if they are to free themselves from the ravages of the aphid pest this year.

Coal Oil Used to Cure

Grub in Head of Sheep

Even with care some sheep will manifest grub in the head which are the larvae of the sheep louse. The symptoms is a discharge of heavy, thick mucus which sometimes seals quite across the nostrils. The sheep are continually snorting to rid themselves of the grub which is in the sinuses which are inside of the head just above each of the eyes. To treat, lay the sheep on their back, feet up, and pour about a teaspoonful of coal oil into each nostril, hold a few minutes and the cure is completed since the grubs are killed and the sheep will snort them out. Don't let the sheep hold up its head, but just lift the nose about an inch from the ground. Just enough so the coal oil will run down and drain into each sinus.

In order that an unbroken supply of vegetables may be had, make another planting of beets, carrots, kale, lettuce, mustard, peas, radishes, spinach, and turnips.

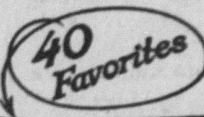
