Makes Himself Plain on Ku Klux in Talk to New Jersey Democrats.

Calling the Ku Klux Klan by name, John W. Davis, Democratic Presidential nominee, declared in an address at Sea Girt, New Jersey, that this organization or any other which raises the standard of racial or religious prejudices, "must be condemned by all who believe as I do in American ideals."

The Democratic nominee's declaration with respect to the Klan was prepared after his arrival there, and was made at the conclusion of his set address, the second of his campaign. It follows:

"There is one other word I wish to say. It concerns a matter that has no proper part in this or any other campaign and which must not be permitted to divert attention from those issues the people must settle in November by their vote. I mention it now in the hope that I may dispose of it once and for all, so far as I am concerned.

"Since my arrival in Sea Girt I have been asked by more than one person now present in this audience what views I entertain concerning the organization known as the Ku Klux Klan. I am constrained to think that those who ask this question did not hear or have not done me the honor to read the speech of acceptance which I delivered at Clarksburg on the eleventh of August.

"In that speech I took occasion to declare that nothing would so utterly destroy our happiness and security at home and our dignity and influence abroad as the separation of the citizenship of this country into discordant groups along racial or religious lines. I affirmed my personal belief in the great guarantee of religious freedom and religious toleration which have made this country what it is, and I asserted it to be the solemn duty of every believer in American institutions to oppose any challenge, organized or unorganized of this sacred declaration under whatever name or in whatever character it might appear.

"It was my purpose to state these truths in language plain enough to

leave no room for doubt or misunderstanding of my personal views and in terms sufficiently broad to include any and all forms of bigotry, prejudice and intolerance. On that declaration I stand. If any organization, no matter what it chooses to be called, whether Ku Klux Klan or by any other name, raises the standard of racial and religious prejudice or attempts to make racial origins or religious beliefs the test of fitness for public office, it does violence to the supremacy of American institutions and must be condemned by all those who believe as I do in American ideals.

"I repeat that these matters must not be permitted to divert the attention of the public from the vital questions now before them. I venture, therefore, to express the hope that the nominee of the Republican party will see fit by some explicit declaration to join in entirely removing this topic from the field of political debate."

DEATHS.

HAINES.—Ralph Haines died suddenly at his residence at Smithtown, one mile west of Millheim, Wednesday afternoon of last week. He had been up and about the house in the forenoon, but had been complaining of not feeling well for several days. It is possible that his death was the result of an auto accident, about a year ago, in which he was injured.

Mr. Haines was aged 48 years, was a member of the Lutheran church, and is survived by his wife and three children, Sarah, Paul and Dorothy. There are also surviving him four brothers and six sisters—Frank, of Kingdon, Texas; John, of Aaronsburg; W. B., of Des Moines, Iowa; Arch, of Altoona, Iowa; Mrs. Kate Musser, of Pleasant Gap; Mrs. Tammie Jones, Scotland, S. Dak.; Mrs. Annie Eisenhuth, State College; Mrs. Sue Stemm, of Millmont, Amanda and Cora Haines, of Aaronsburg. He was the second of twelve children to pass away.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, and interment made in the Millheim cemetery.

GRENOBLE.—Mrs. Joanna Grenoble, widow of George Grenoble, died at her home about three miles west of Madisonburg, of paralysis, aged seventy years, 2 months and 5 days.

Surviving her are the six sons and three daughters—B. F. J. W., G. E., and C. P. Grenoble, T. J., H. L., Mrs. Scott Rachau, and Mrs. C. E. Duck, all of Madisonburg, and Elsie, at home.

Funeral services were held on Saturday morning at the Yearick church, conducted by Rev. J. F. Bingham, of Centre Hall. Interment in the Reformed cemetery at Madisonburg.

NEW METHOD OF ISSUING LICENSES.

Owners of Cars Will Receive Filled In Applications for 1925 Permits.

Since Tuesday Pennsylvania owners of motor cars began receiving from the Automobile Division of the State Highway Department, Harrisburg, already filled-in applications for 1925 licenses. It is only necessary for them to sign their names and return to the division with proper remittance.

The State Highway Department issued the following statement relative to 1925 applications for automobile licenses:

"Prior to the year 1925 it was the custom in Pennsylvania for motor vehicle owners to make application for registration of their motor vehicles before a notary public, justice of the peace, or the other officer empowered to administer oaths. In many hundreds of thousands of cases applicants swore to the same facts year after year, paying a fee of at least 50 cents. Although a fee was paid for filling out the application and administering the oath, thousands of applications were returned for correction because of oversight on the part of the person administering the oath or the applicants themselves.

"In order to eliminate the needless return of many applications, the application forms in the future will be made out in the automobile division and mailed to the applicant for his signature and remittance. This mailing began Tuesday and will continue until October 15th, at which time it is believed all motor vehicle owners in Pennsylvania will have received their form of application for the year 1925.

"Motorists are particularly warned to refrain from requesting application forms until Oct. 15. If by that time they have not received their form of application, they should communicate with the automobile division, giving their name and address, as well as their title number, and a duplicate form will immediately be sent them.

"Another service the department will render this year will be the forwarding of a return addressed envelope in which the applicant should enclose his application and fee.

"The 1924 license tags are valid until midnight, December 31, 1924, while operators' licenses are valid until midnight, February 28, 1925. A similar system has been installed for operators' licenses and forms for renewal of such licenses will be forwarded from this division Jan. 1, 1925.

"If the operator's address has changed since he was issued 1924 license tags or certificate of title, the automobile division should be advised immediately in order that records may be changed and form forwarded with the proper address named thereon.

"Applications for 1925 license tags will be acted upon within 24 hours of their receipt by the automobile division."
