**A LITTLE TRIBUTE TO PROTECTORS OF ROADSIDE SPRINGS**

**Observer Gives a Thought to the Memory of Unknown Public Benefactors Who Took Time and Effort to Improve Them.**

"Dorothy Deane," one of the regular contributors to the Williamsport Sun, who is one of its writers who touches the hearts of her readers, recently made this contribution that warrants reprinting in the columns of the Reporter:

"I notice," says my woods friend, "that the state highway department is going to have tests made of the water from all springs along state highways, for the purpose of determining whether the water is fit for drinking purposes, with the intention of marking the springs and informing travelers whether the water is safe or dangerous.

"That's a good thing to do, as there are undoubtedly many springs now in use the water from which is not suited for drinking purposes, and again there are many springs near roads which would not be noticed unless plainly marked."

"By the way," my friend continued, "when you stop at a spring by the wayside, or deep in the woods, and find it carefully walled up, so that the water has a good flow and is deep enough to draw water from easily, did you ever stop to wonder who it was that, many years ago, took the time and trouble to render this service to his fellowmen?"

"Many a time I have been hiking along a hot road and have come to a welcome spring, with its moss-covered walls and protecting slab of rock offering evidence that some kind hearted person gave a thought for others many years ago, and have thought that though he might be gathered to his fathers long ago, his benefaction still endures.

"A cup of water to the thirsty is about as welcome as any gift this world can offer, and often I pay silent tribute to the persons who cleaned out these springs and protected them. Not only along the road sides but deep in the woods one will come across these carefully protected springs and often is led to think of who it was that did this noble work, my friend observed."
