BIG JUMP IN AUTO FIGURES.

Motor-License Fees to October 1 Are \$6,000,000 Ahead of Those of Year Ago—1,322,478 Car Operators.

Receipts from State motor license fees to the beginning of October were nearly \$6,000,000 in excess of those received by the State Highway Department in the same period in 1923. So far the receipts are nearly \$20,000,000.

The Highway Department issued a comparative statement showing motor vehicle registration as of September 30, 1924. In nine months of this year 1,019,094 passenger cars were registered, compared with 957,550 in the same period in 1923.

The registration of all operators of cars, owners and others also has brought about a great increase in receipts from this source of license. There were 252,210 licensed operators last year and 1,322,478 this year, and the receipts from this source last year were \$252,210, while this year they are \$1,322,132.

The honesty of car owners is not improving, according to the department's figures, for last year 147 of the checks sent in for fee payments were protested and \$735 was collected in fines, while this year 2375 checks were protested and \$14,375 was collected in fines.

Musical Recital, October 17th.
