Korman who remains to mourn her departure. She leaves one son, Warren T. Korman, of Coburn; two grandsons, Guy and Charles Korman, of Coburn; two brothers, Cyrus and Thomas Meyer, of Coburn; three half-brothers, William Meyer, of Curwensville, Phillip and Jacob Meyer, of Coburn.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Korman died in infancy. A brother and sister of Mrs. Korman died within the last two years. Funeral services were conducted by the family's pastor, Rev. John S. Hollenbach, on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, at the Korman home and continued in the Coburn Reformed church. Interment was made at Millheim.
