### Good Control Is Fixed Habit of G. Alexander

Grover Cleveland Alexander, of the Chicago Nationals, started pitching at Galesburg, Ill., in 1909. He is thirty-seven years old, but Alex apparently is the type that improves with age.

His masterful control was displayed during the training trip in Texas. Facing the Wichita Falls Texas leaguers, Grover allowed one hit to twelve batters in four innings, did not grant a pass, and pitched twenty balls. Then he retired to let some of his pupils do "laboratory work."

One of Alexander's feats not in the record book was pitching 51 2-3 consecutive innings without a base on balls—and then Tillie Walker walked. This record was made in 1923, when Alex was only one year younger than he is now.

Bill Killefer, once his battery mate, says Alexander's reputation as the "king of control" is due entirely to his wonderful condition at all times.

### Fowler Will Not Return

Contrary to expectations, Bob Fowler, who has served as trainer of the Williams football team for the past three years, will not return to fill the post this fall, John Hearn having been engaged to take his place. Fowler is in South America and he has found it impossible to return to take his old position. Hearn has served as assistant at Harvard for eight years and he is regarded as an excellent choice to succeed Fowler.

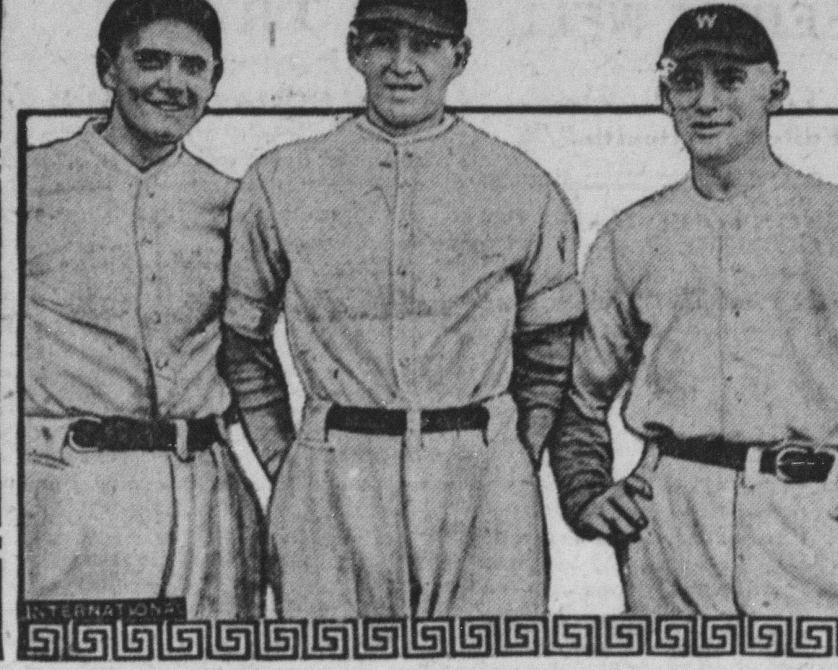
### Poor Old Man Baseball

## Sport Notes

Minnesota meets Vanderbilt for the first time at football November 22.

National tennis champion Bill Tilden has won 13 Davis Cup matches.

James Wilson, former Toledo boxer, is now a prominent architect in Hollywood.

Among the sports that have enjoyed a rapid growth in the United States is ice hockey.

Grey Lag, six-year-old Rancocas stable thoroughbred, has broken down in training.

Philadelphia's Athletics finished last in the American league seven straight seasons.

An open air fight arena has been built in Mexico City, which will seat 15,000 spectators.

Morgan G. Bulkeley, first president of the National league, died November 8, 1922, at Hartford, Conn.

Detroit's 20 to 1 victory over Cleveland, September 5, was the largest score piled up in the American league this season.

Jack Zeigler, crack right-hand pitcher of the Evansville Three-I league club, has been bought by Kansas City.

It is gratifying to oarsmen to have Doctor Meyfair of Columbus say that oarsmen live on the average five years longer than other men.

A polo pony is a cross between thoroughbred racing stock and the wiry, game, intelligent and tireless ponies of the cattle ranges.

Chicago, Cleveland and Detroit are the original members of the American league now in the present circuit. The league was formed in 1900.

Earl Webb, outfielder and pitcher, who has been with Pittsfield of the Eastern league under option, has been obtained by Toledo from the New York Giants.

Pitcher Dunagan of Dyersburg of the Kitty league ended the season with an unfinished run of 13 straight victories. His record for the season was 22 wins in 24 starts.

No sooner had Pedro Dibut, Cuban pitcher of the Reds, left his sick bed to rejoin his team than Adolfo Luque, his fellow countryman, became ill for a brief spell.

Franklin Fort, property of the Chattanooga Southern league team, who has played throughout the season with Decatur is now the property of the latter club through purchase.

Manager Killefer of Seattle denies the report that Jimmy Welsh, his star outfielder, has been sold to the Chicago Cubs. Killefer says that he has had several offers from big league clubs for Welsh, but none of them have been accepted.

Captain Ingraham, former U. S. Naval Academy football star, picks the University of Washington football eleven to break the University of California's string of victories when the rivals clash at Seattle November 8.

Denver Ed Martin, once one of the leading heavyweight pugilists, now living at Portland, Ore., may try a "comeback" shortly. He is forty-six years of age but feels he can make short work of some of the present day boxers.

During the 1923-24 athletic season Yale won 237 victories, suffered 101 defeats and tied in seven other contests in varied sports. Yale lost only to Princeton in baseball in "Big Three" competition, making a sweep in football, track, crew and baseball against Harvard. The athletics-for-all program at the New Haven institution in several branches had 2,476 members.

## Suzanne Lenglen Is to Resume Play at Tennis

Now that the Wimbledon tennis tournament, the Olympics and the women's national championships in the United States are over and tennis is on the wane for 1924, Mile. Lenglen, who hung up her racquet "forever," has recovered from the illness which she feared had ended her career.

The French champion, who has never been defeated in a completed match—Suzanne retired coughing when trailing Molla Mallory at Forest Hills two years ago—said that her health, which prevented her meeting Helen Wills while the California girl was abroad, has been restored.

"I am going to the Riviera in a couple of weeks and commence training," Mile. Lenglen said. "I will play in my first tournament in December."

## Epinard's Famous Uncle Draws Peddler's Wagon

Epinard, France's famous thoroughbred, has an uncle in Louisville who is drawing a peddler's wagon. Hawthorne, now fourteen years old, somewhat wind-broken but not lacking in the comforts of old age, is Epinard's uncle. Hawthorne's mother was White Thorn and White Thorn also was Epinard's grandmother.

Twelve years ago Hawthorne defeated the cream of two-year-olds and won the famous Bashford Manor stakes at Churchill Downs. Today Hawthorne has dropped from the picture of flower-decked victor and his days are passing peacefully with a light cart behind him, or at odd times, drawing a plow in a Louisville suburb.
