

Pittsburgh. - All capable men who apply for employment at the Pitcairn yards of the Pennsylvania railroad are given places and there is still an urgent need for men. Repair workmen are said to be needed badly, as much of the rolling stock is being repaired. At the plant of the Westinghouse Arbrake Company, at Wilmerding, nearby, men who have been working two and three days a week are back at full time, and in some departments many new men have been given employment.
