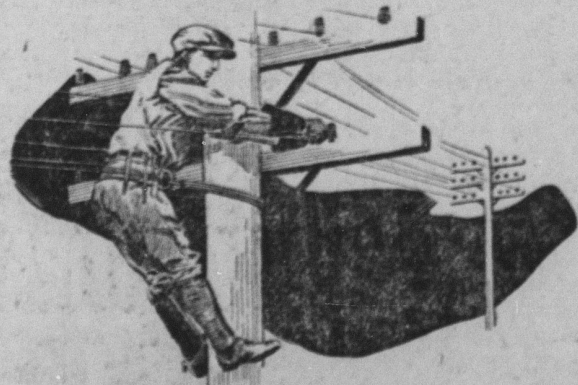

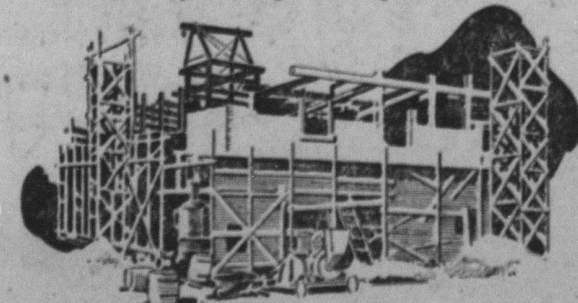
The Telephone Service Job—

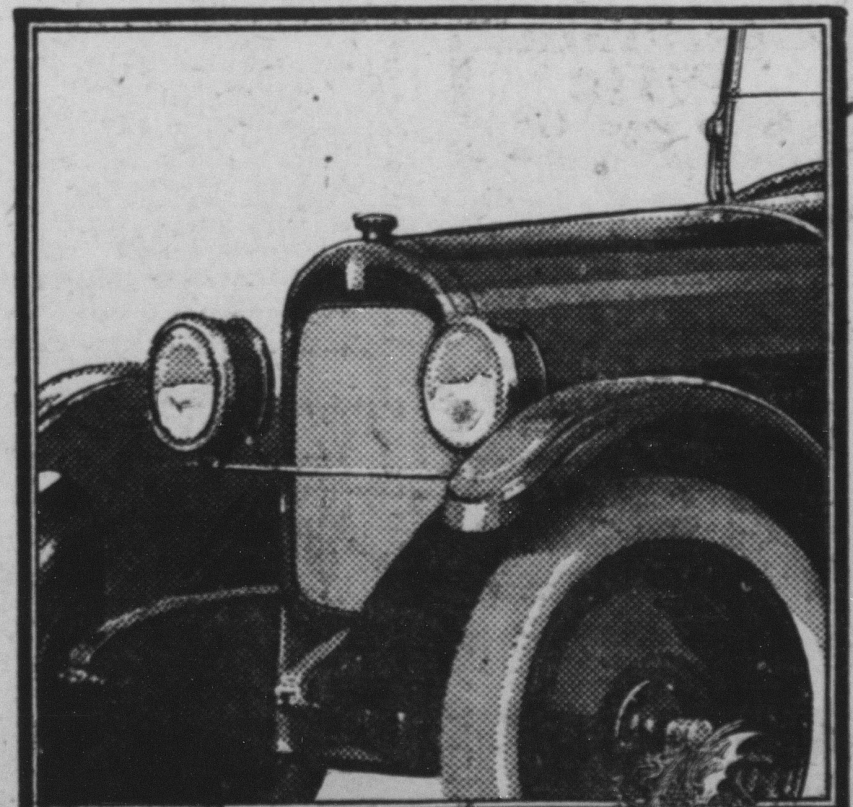
