PENNSYLVANIA STATE ITEMS

Altoona.—His skull fractured and both legs crushed by a fall of rock in a Pennsylvania Coal and Coke Corporation mine at Gallitzin, Frank Bice, 58, died several hours later in the Altoona Hospital.

Pittsburgh.—Beer valued at \$100,000 and 2000 barrels, seized recently, will be destroyed under an order signed by Judge Glison.

Shamokin.—Charles G. Miller, aged 87, a carpenter, died at a hospital from injuries received when he plunged from the second story of a garage.

Philadelphia.—Lewis Emery, Jr., for many years a prominent figure in independent politics and fusion candidate for governor in 1906, died in Hahnemann Hospital. He was 85 years old and had been in ill health and under treatment for the past six months. Funeral services were held at his home in Bradford.

Clearfield.—Harry Bridge, well known local tailor and trout fisherman, dreamed that he was catching a lot of big trout from a pool of water which had formed on the parlor floor of his home on West Front street. A fire burned the roof off the house and the pool of water on the parlor floor was no dream. The fire loss is about \$2000.

Harrisburg.—Two persons, R. M. Keller and his infant son, lost their lives in a fire which badly damaged the Keller home here. Keller went to his death when he returned to the burning house in an attempt to rescue the child after his wife and three other children had been removed safely.

Wilkes-Barre.—Although he was securely handcuffed and the train on which he was riding was traveling 55 miles an hour, John Killian, aged 19, of Plymouth, plunged headfirst through a window in an attempt to avoid imprisonment in the Huntingdon Reformatory. When he was captured an hour after his spectacular leap he was only slightly injured.

Mahanoy City.—Michael Chobin, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Chobin, of Cortkov, a mining village about three miles south of this city, met death by electrocution when he came in contact with a wire carrying 11,000 volts. Young Chobin and friends were playing games when Chobin suddenly decided to climb the steel tower. In doing so he came in contact with the high-powered wire. His lifeless body fell to the ground.

Reading.—John E. Kurtz, 49, for several years landlord of the Kurtz House, Oakbrook, ended his life by cutting his throat with a meat knife. His body was found by Lewis Landy, living in the same apartment house here.

Lebanon.—John H. Light, 60, of Annville, escaped injury when his team was struck by a Reading railway express on the Annville grade crossing. The wagon was struck squarely by the locomotive and smashed to pieces, after being hurled through the air for many feet. Light and his mules were unhurt.

Philadelphia.—An epidemic of hicoughs has broken out in Upper Darby township and is spreading, despite the efforts of the doctors in that section to curb it. Dr. Harry J. Hurley reported that he has treated 26 such cases during the past two days. The epidemic has also spread to Llanarth. Most of the sufferers there, however, are babies, according to Dr. Rodenhiser, baby specialist of the Presbyterian Hospital, this city, who has been kept on the go night and day trying to relieve his little patients.

Pittsburgh.—Judge Joseph Buffington, of the United States circuit court of appeals, and Mrs. Marguerite Fairfax Clendenin, of New Castle, were married by Dr. Remsen B. Ogilby, president of Trinity College, Hartford, Conn. Judge Buffington, who is 71 years old, recovered several months ago from injuries received in an automobile accident at Akron, O. in which Mrs. Clendenin also was hurt.

Philadelphia.—Persons at Seventeenth and Girard avenue were hurried to see a young boy flourish a revolver, which they did not know to be empty. Policeman Hellinger chased the lad, who later described himself as Wharton Hamon, 16 years old. He was charged with carrying concealed deadly weapons, although as the sergeant remarked, the weapon was neither deadly nor concealed. The gun for once wasn't loaded.

Hollidaysburg.—Assemblyman-elect Kenzie S. Bagshaw was elected master of the Blair County Pomona Grange.

Shamokin.—Business men and civic leaders plan to change the coal region town from a borough to a third-class city.

Tyrone.—Members of the Board of Health and School Board took steps to check an epidemic of scarlet fever in the city.

Hazleton.—With no additions to the police force within 12 years, Mayor Harvey will ask for five more officers and increases in salaries.

Hazleton.—Furs valued at \$3000 were stolen from the store of H. Steiner, furrier.

Pottsville.—The body of the man who froze to death near here was identified as that of Valentine Kunzig, missing from the county home for two weeks.

RUNNING A RABBITRY

RABBITS, it is true, don't furnish eggs! But, otherwise, in the advantages their raising offers, they closely parallel that other friend of the small town or country girl—the chicken.

And the larger varieties resemble turkey, rather than chicken, in the quantity of meat they develop. So reasons a little high school girl I know, who has been running her back yard bunny farm for three years.

"You don't have to bother much about experience, special education or expense, when you go into the rabbit raising business," she declares, "all you need is a corner of your own back yard. In fact, it costs less to produce rabbit meat than it does to supply chicken for the table."

An empty dry goods box was what this girl used for her first hutch, but she was careful to keep it clean and dry. She had a sliding screen door on the front of the box to provide ventilation; small holes at the top, she said, will provide the necessary air with even less trouble. At night and during storms, she carried the hutch into an empty shed. The rabbit raiser must make sure of some such sheltered place she can take her rabbits when necessary.

She should secure animals that are large, and of sound, hardy stock. The Belgian hare is best for food purposes, because of its great weight, rapid development and superior meat quality.

The rabbit raiser may feed her creatures anything from the garden that would otherwise go to waste. She will have to store green food for them during the winter.

She should not handle young rabbits. She should write to the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., asking for bulletins No. 496 and No. 131C, which will give her complete information about the business and prevent her making any bad mistakes.

At four months, the little rabbits, which should now weigh about six pounds, are ready for market. The rabbit raiser should try to sell them to a poultry dealer. If the rabbits are to be sold alive on the market, all that is necessary is to crate them. But when they are to be delivered dressed, they should be carefully packed, so that they will not arrive in a messy condition. Dressed rabbits which come to the buyer in an unattractive condition are the worst of advertisements.

DOLL-DRESS SET STYLES ON "MAIN STREET"

BRINGING Fifth Avenue to Main Street, via the doll-dressing route, has been "the making" of one young girl whose only capital was her originality.

"Heavens! what can any girl do in a dinky little town like this?" was her first thought when she finished school and began to look around for "something to do." But one day, Jean, now official doll-dresser for a little Oklahoma town, happened to notice her little sister's doll. Little sister had it tied up in a sort of pillow-slip looking garment of her own concoction, and Jean thought, "why not give the doll a decent dress?"

"Well, I made her a real 'Paris creation' while I was at it—I'd had a brief trip to New York just after school was out," Jean confided to me. "The result was so chic that it not only pleased little sister, and made her playmates want their dolls dressed likewise, but also interested the mothers. In a short time, I had a small business that has grown steadily."

Jean makes complete costumes for her patrons' dolls. Stockings, from discarded silk hose; little shoes from old kid gloves; miniature silk vests, step-ins, delectable nighties, party dresses, wraps and hats are all "made-overs" from discarded clothes. They are carefully made, and the tiny label "Jeanne" in each miniature hat or gown gives the final Fifth Avenue touch—but not to the pocket-book, for her prices are reasonable.

Although Jean says no advertising is necessary, the girl who wants to dress dolls professionally may advertise in the local paper; or telephone all the women she knows who have children of the doll-crazing age.

Her biggest business will, of course, be before Christmas time, but there are plenty of birthdays throughout the year. A spring style show, too, will stimulate business.

To further supplement her business, the doll modiste may turn instructor in slack season. She could take a class of little girls once a week, teaching them how to make their own doll-clothes.
