Resting her hand upon the shield of a double-headed cross, emblem of the citizen tuberculosis societies, she indicates she is defending the world against tuberculosis. This is a happy symbolism of the tuberculosis movement in its preventive activities. It is considered the most beautiful Seal issued during the seventeen years the Christmas Seal has been sold.

Pennsylvania Early In Tuberculosis Fight

The Pennsylvania Tuberculosis Society was organized 32 years ago to conduct the volunteer fight against tuberculosis in Pennsylvania. It has carried on a constant educational campaign for better health and has organized groups all over the state to carry on the work locally.

The Pennsylvania Tuberculosis Society and affiliated organizations are financed almost entirely through the annual sale of Christmas Seals.

During these 32 years the death rate from tuberculosis in Pennsylvania has been greatly reduced, a clinic system established, sanatoria and hospitals built, the number of public health nurses has been greatly increased, open air schools established, and many other things accomplished in the campaign against this plague and diseases in general.

This effort has meant: Many thousands of lives saved. Less illness and worry. The life span lengthened at least five years.

Workers were enabled to produce more and live more happily. More fathers have been enabled to keep the home fires burning.

More mothers have been enabled to guide their boys and girls through the trying period of childhood.

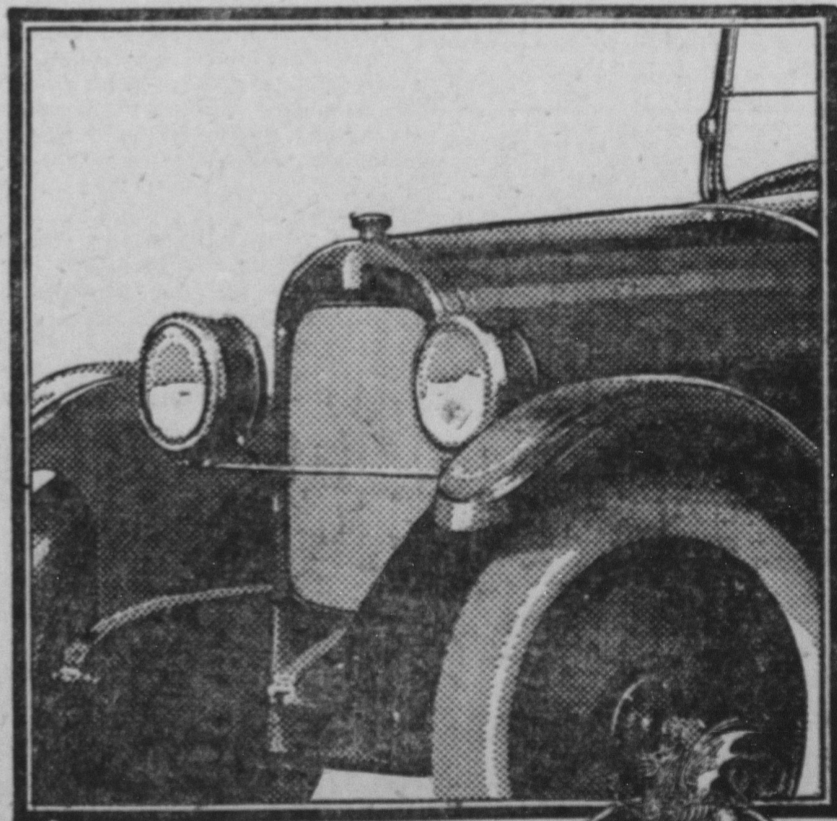
