The Centre Democrat Sold. The Centre Democrat, owned by Charles R. Kurtz from 1895 until his death a few months ago, and since conducted by Mrs. Kurtz, has been sold to the Walker brothers—Evan, Milan and Cecil, who will take charge of the paper about April 1st.

Mr. Kurtz took charge of the Democrat under lease in 1888, and seven years later became its owner. Under his management the paper for the first time became self-sustaining and later profitable.
