CENTRE COUNTIAN SHOT BY BANDITS IN TEXAS

Daddy R. Stover at Point of Death Due to Four Bullet Wounds in Abdomen While on Duty at San Antonio, Texas.

A telegram received by Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Stover, at State College, informed them that their son, David Rhinesmith Stover, was seriously wounded by bandits while on duty with the Santa Fe railroad company, with which company he has been employed for twenty or more years in various capacities.

The information received by telegram by the parents is not very definite in some respects. It appears that Mr. Stover received four bullet wounds in the abdomen, and is now at a hospital at San Antonio, Texas, where it is presumed the shooting took place. At last reports probing failed to locate any of the bullets. His condition is very serious.

Mr. Stover is aged about forty-one years and is the eldest of the Stover family. When quite a young man he entered the employment of the Santa Fe railroad company and has since been with them. He is at present living at San Antonio, with his wife and daughter, aged about twelve years.

DEATHS.

RHOADS.—Adam S. Rhoads, a native of Millheim, but whose home was at Oak Hall, died suddenly while seated at the supper table.

Mr. Rhoads was the second son of John H. and Jane Rhoads and was born in Millheim July 27, 1871, making his age at the time of death 53 years, 6 months and 4 days.

He was employed in the Oak Hall quarries and had not complained of any ailment. He worked all day Saturday prior to his return home and his subsequent death.

He is survived by his wife and seven children in addition to his mother, two brothers and four sisters, among the latter being Mrs. C. G. Hassinger and Mrs. W. J. Shull, both of Millheim. Interment was made at Houserville.

WYLE.—Mrs. Sarah Wyle, widow of Jacob H. Wyle, and a native of Aaronsburg, departed this life at the home of her son, J. R. Wyle, of Medina, Ohio, of pneumonia, which she contracted after having had a stroke of paralysis on New Year's day.

Mrs. Wyle was the daughter of Jacob and Elizabeth Holloway and was born at Aaronsburg December 24th, 1835, making her age at the time of death, 89 years, 1 month and 7 days.

She spent most of her life in Aaronsburg, having moved from there about eighteen years ago to the son's home where she died.

Her husband preceded her in death about twenty years ago; five of her eight children (dying in infancy) also preceded her to the grave.

She is survived by three sons, W. C. Wyle and B. W. of Akron, O.; and J. R. of Medina, Ohio, and two brothers—Frank A. Holloway, of Cedarville, Ill.; and James E. Holloway, of Aaronsburg; also eight grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

The remains were shipped to Aaronsburg to the home of J. H. Crouse from where burial services were held Tuesday forenoon of last week, conducted by Rev. F. H. Daubenspeck.

Interment was made in the Reformed cemetery at that place.

RICKERT.—Susanna Rickert (nee Gramley) died at her home in Cedarville, Ill., where she had resided since 1867. She was born in Rebersburg, January 27, 1841, was the oldest child of John and Maria Gramley, and the last surviving member of the family.

Her mother died in 1907 and her brothers Oliver and Byron several years ago. Her husband, Henry Rickert, died in 1922, and surviving her are four children—J. Logan, of Redondo Beach, Calif.; J. Clyde, of Columbus, Ohio; Mrs. Oliver Troxell, of Cedarville, Ill. Burial was made at Cedarville. Rev. Dr. McNary, of the First Presbyterian church, of Freeport, Ill., officiating.

ROYER.—George Royer died at the home of his son, Frank Royer, near Woodward, from dropsy, aged eighty-one years, 9 months. Nearly all his life was spent in Millheim, where he followed the carpenter trade.

His wife, who was Elvina Confer, passed to the great beyond November 19, 1911, at the age of 69 years and 9 months. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Jane Walker, of Millheim, and four children: F. P., of Woodward; S. H., of Millmont; Mrs. E. H. Zimmerman and Mrs. S. R. King, both of Millheim.

HENDRICKS.—Mrs. Henry Hendricks died at her home in Pittsburg, of softening of the brain, aged 56 years.

Her maiden name was Sarah Hoy, a daughter of the venerable John S. Hoy, of near Madisonburg, and she was born in Miles township.

WORLD WAR VETERAN FOUND DEAD IN SHANTY

Utahville Man Found in Lonely Shed Evidently A Suicide.

Foster McGarvey, World war veteran, aged 28 years, missing from the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William McGarvey, in Irvona, since Thursday, was found dead in a shanty near Glen Hope, in the Phillipsburg region, Saturday afternoon.

The coroner's inquiry revealed that he had been shot through the heart. The examination indicated the fatal wound was self-inflicted. There was no known cause for the deed.

Almost constantly since returning from overseas McGarvey has been working at Clymer, until about six weeks ago when he was laid off. Since that time he has been at the home of his father at Utahville.

On Friday night he was seen at Glen Hope, a few miles from his home. The theory is that he was returning home when he entered the shed, which is some distance from the road, gaining entrance through a window. He had built a fire to warm himself and then committed the crime, which was probably premeditated, since he carried the revolver from his father's home. His father had not seen him since Thursday noon, when he left home.
