**DAY OF PRAYER FOR MISSIONS**

Federation of Woman's Boards of Foreign Missions and Council of Women Set, Feb. 27, Evening, as Time in Lutheran Church.

As has been the custom for several years, the Federation of Woman's Boards of Foreign Missions of North America, and Council of Women for Home Missions, has designated a Day of Prayer for Missions, and has set Friday, February 27, as the time. The women of the various local churches have prepared a fitting program to be given on the evening of that day in the Lutheran church. Of course, these services are open to all.

The Federation of Woman's Boards of Foreign Missions of North America and the Council of Women for Home Missions are the two great cooperating agencies uniting the missionary women of America.

The Federation is composed of thirty-one organizations, including denominational Woman's Foreign Boards of the United States and Canada, the interdenominational Woman's Union Missionary Society of America, the National Board of the Young Women's Christian Association, the American McAll Association and the Student Volunteer Movement. There are standing committees on Student Work, Methods of Work, Interdenominational Institutions on the Foreign Field, Summer Schools and Conferences, Christian Literature for Women and Children in Mission Fields, and Foreign Students in America; the Central Committee on the United Study of Foreign Missions serves as the Committee on Publications and Literature. The headquarters are at 25 Madison Avenue, New York City.

The Council is composed of twenty national Women's Home Mission Boards and Societies in the United States and Canada. Nineteen schools of Missions and Conferences are affiliated with the Council and it annually conducts a Home Mission Institute at Chautauqua, New York. There are three consulting organizations: National Board of the Young Women's Christian Association, National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and Student Fellowship for Christian Life-Service. The Council and the Missionary Education Movement are, each year, joint publishers of the books for Home Mission study. Close cooperation is maintained with the Home Missions Council, through joint standing committees covering phases of work and groups of people in the United States and Alaska. The headquarters are situated at 154 Fifth Avenue, New York City.
