**DEATHS.**

**HORNER.** - Anna Mary, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orvis Horner, died at the parental home, at Colyer, early Sunday morning, of convulsions. The child was aged six weeks. Besides the parents, two sisters and two brothers survive. Burial was made Monday afternoon in Zion Hill cemetery.

**PACKER.** - Nathan Packer, died at his home in Howard from paralysis, aged sixty-nine years. Interment was made Saturday at Romolo. He was a son of James Packer, deceased, and was one of three sons by his first wife. There survive him his step-mother, Mrs. Wilmena Packer, and several half-brothers, one of whom is Prof. L. O. Packer, of Centre Hall, and several half-sisters; also, a wife and children.

**BARTHOLOMEW.** - Enis Bartholomew died at Avia, February 19th, aged 89 years, 4 months and 12 days. He was buried February 22nd at Cedar Hill cemetery, Salona. Funeral services were held in the M. E. church, of which denomination the deceased was a life-long member. A very able sermon was delivered by the officiating minister in charge, Rev. Kretz. Deceased was born at Salona, Clinton county, in the year 1835. He was a cabinet maker by occupation, and an expert mechanic. He also engaged in the mercantile business at different times. Early in life he was united in marriage to Barbara Welkel, who preceded him to the grave nine years ago. He was a good citizen, a kind neighbor, loved and respected by all who knew him.

**BENNER.** - Mrs. Adda C. Benner died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Willis Houtz, at Boalsburg, after a few days illness of accomplishment of diseases. Mrs. Benner was a daughter of Thomas and Jane Marshall, both deceased, and was born at Pleasant Gap, March 26, 1854, making her age 70 years, 10 months and 17 days. She was married to M. W. Benner, January 25, 1877, who preceded her to the grave 18 years ago, as did one son, Miles, who died at four years of age. Surviving her are the following children: Mrs. Bellefonte; Mrs. Willis Houtz, Boalsburg; Mrs. Dorsey Strubbe, State College; Harry, Lemont; Edwin, State College; two grandchildren, Paul Benner and Donald Strubbe, and one brother, Mairt Marshall, Louisiana. The deceased was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church of Lemont, which she attended regularly when able. Interment was made in the Meyer cemetery by the side of her husband. The officiating ministers were Rev. C. W. Risher, Pleasant Gap; Rev. M. C. Piper, Millsburg, and Rev. W. W. Moyer, Boalsburg.
