DEATHS.

KERLIN.—Rev. A. A. Kerlin, who died at Sharpsburg, Maryland, last week, was born in Potter township, having been a son of the late Peter Kerlin, April 1, 1840, making his age almost eighty-five years. For a period of twenty-two years he served the Water Street, Petersburg, Lutheran charge, and from there went to Sharpsburg, where he retired six months ago, having given his services there for twenty-eight years.

Mrs. Kerlin, who before marriage was Miss Ella Huber, survives the deceased, as do also these children: Bert, Brooklyn, N. Y.; and Mrs. Beulah Cronico, of near Harpers Ferry, West Virginia. A second son, Percival, was killed in an auto wreck seven years ago.

The funeral was largely attended and was conducted by Rev. Hesse, president of the conference to which the charge covered by the deceased belonged, and Revs. Remsburg and Ashley.

On February 18, last, Rev. and Mrs. Kerlin celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Although having left the old home scenes many years ago, Rev. Kerlin kept in touch with the movements here through this paper, having been a constant reader of it all the while. He frequently made contributions to its columns and never failed to refer most affectionately to the people about Colver, west of which point he was born.

ZERBY.—Mrs. Elizabeth Zerby died at her home in the vicinity of Zerby Station, on Saturday, aged forty-three years. Interment was made in Millheim on Tuesday. The husband and several children survive her. The deceased was a daughter of the late Aaron Ulrich.

KUHN.—Harvey Kuhn died in an Altoona hospital, following an operation for appendicitis. The remains were shipped to Dewart for interment, which took place on Friday.

The deceased was a son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Kuhn, of Dewart, formerly of near Centre Hall. He was born at Old Fort.

At the time of his death the young man was employed by the Pennsylvania Railroad company in the Altoona shops. He was aged some twenty years. He is survived by his parents and several brothers and sisters.

M. E. Conference.

The annual session of the Central Pennsylvania conference of the Methodist Episcopal church will this year be held in Chambersburg where it will convene on Wednesday, March 18, with Bishop W. F. McDowell presiding. One important matter which will come up for discussion is the proposal of the union of the Methodist churches, north and south, which have been divided since the Civil war.

Pastors within the conference are anticipating many changes in pastoral assignments. Rev. E. R. Heckerman, who has been superintendent of the Harrisburg district the past six years, will be returned to pastoral work, and Rev. Morris E. Swartz, who has been serving as area secretary, will also be given a ministerial assignment. Quite a number of ministers are completing their allotted time in their present churches and will likely be assigned elsewhere.

"State" Loses to Bucknell.

Bucknell university and State College met at Lewisburg Saturday evening in their annual debate. Benjamin F. Focht presided. The question was: "Resolved, That Congress by a Two-thirds Vote, Should Have the Power to Declare Effective the Federal Law Which Has Been Pronounced Unconstitutional by the Supreme Court."

Bucknell, represented by Alexander Wilson, Wallace Kennerly and Francis Lybarger, upheld the affirmative and was awarded the decision by the judges. State College, upholding the negative, was represented by S. K. Stevens, C. S. Grove and E. B. Everett. The judges were: The Rev. M. H. Rupp, of Lewisburg; Carl L. Millard, of Milton, and the Rev. M. M. Keefe, of Millifenburg.

Enforcement by Land and Sea.

Chief Justice Taft, writing the opinion for the Supreme Court, dealt a powerful blow at the bootleggers when he said that automobiles or other vehicles suspected of containing contraband liquor, could be searched by enforcement officers without warrant. He stressed the difference between a search of a dwelling or other structure and a search of a ship, motorboat, wagon or automobile for forbidden goods where it was not practicable to obtain a warrant for a person "on wheels."

Now comes Federal Judge Edwin L. Garvin, in Brooklyn, who further defines the right of United States officers to seize vessels, even flying a foreign flag and outside of the 12-mile limit, when such vessels are proposing to land liquor on American soil. This decision is based on Section 592 of the tariff act of 1922, which provides that if any person enters or attempts to enter merchandise into the United States by means of false invoice, declaration, or paper of any kind, or by means of any fraudulent practice, such merchandise shall be subject to forfeiture.

Masking in Texas Illegal.

A bill prohibiting the wearing of masks in public was signed on Monday by Governor Miriam Ferguson of Texas. It provides severe penalties for persons entering public buildings, churches, or private residences while masked. It was a Democratic party pledge of the last campaign and resulted mainly from flogging parties staged by masked bands in Texas during the last few years, said Representative Holbrook, author of the bill.

One section of the law, which becomes effective immediately, declares it unlawful "for any secret society or organization or a part of the members thereof, masked or disguised, to parade upon or along any public road or any street or alley of any city or town in the State."
