**MINNICH.**—Amy Almete Minnich, daughter of Scott and Susan Stover, died at her home in Mifflinburg, April 9th, of a complication of diseases, aged 38 years, 6 months and 19 days. Interment was made at Rebersburg. She leaves to mourn her departure her husband, Lester Minnich, and two sons, Stover and Leroy, both parents a brother, Edgar, of Bloomfield, N. J., two sisters, Mrs. Lizzie Wance and Mrs. Carrie Houser, of Rebersburg.

**LUTZ.**—Hiram Lutz, well known farmer residing at Zion, died suddenly Thursday morning of last week about three o'clock of neuralgia of the heart. His death comes as a shock to his many friends. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Lutz and was born in Centre county, and was aged 68 years, 9 months and 2 days. Besides his wife he is survived by two sons, Edgar and Fred, both of Zion, and one daughter, Mrs. Shope, of State College.

**MUSSER.**—Mrs. Blanche Dale Musser, wife of Frank Musser of near Bellefonte, died at her home at ten o'clock Tuesday morning of last week of complications following a short illness. She was the daughter of George and Lena Dale and was born at Dale Summit 64 years ago. She was united in marriage to Mrs. Musser who survives with the following children: George, of Middleburg, N. Y.; Robert, of Griffin, Ga., and Malcolm at home. Three brothers, Willard, of Bellefonte, John, of State College, and Horace, of Rushville, Neb., also survive with one sister, Lillian, of Harrisburg. Funeral services were held from the home, the Rev. William E. Thompson, pastor of the Presbyterian church, officiating. Interment in the Union cemetery.

**ARD.**—Dr. Wilson Potter Ard, one of the oldest physicians of Centre county, died at his home at Woodward, Thursday morning of last week. He had been in feeble health for some time but his death was sudden and unexpected.

He was a son of George and Emeline Harvey Ard and was born at Lewistown on April 15th, 1845, hence was within six days of being eighty years old. He was educated in the Tuscarora Academy, receiving his degree in medicine at the Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, in 1880, after studying under Dr. Pancoast.

He first located in Lebanon county but in the fall of 1882 came to Centre county and established himself at Woodward, where he built up a large practice.

At Reading he married Miss Amanda E. Moser, and of their five children, three survive, as follows: Joseph B. of Woodward; George, of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Kuhlman, wife of Dr. Kuhlman, of Pittsburgh. Burial was made at Woodward.

**CANTNER.**—Joseph Cantner, a native of Millheim, who has resided in Sistriville, W. Va., for many years,

died at the age of about sixty-eight years. Heart trouble was the cause of his death. His wife and five children survive; also three brothers and two sisters, among the latter being Mrs. Clara Welsor, of Millheim. Burial was made at Sistriville.

**Pasture Saves in Pork Production.**

Successful hog men in Centre county have found that it pays to have a pasture in profitable pork production. They are again planning on having good pastures for their 1925 crops of hogs.

Pasture demonstration work carried on by the agricultural extension department of the Penna. State College bears out the results obtained in this county. These demonstrations staged in all sections of the state indicate that pigs on pasture require 133 pounds less feed to produce 100 pounds gain than is required by pigs fed in dry lots.

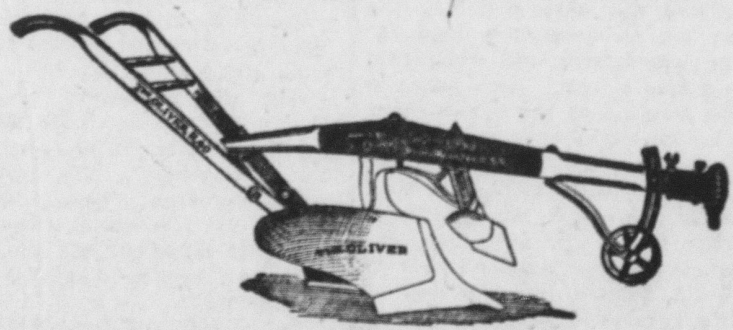
Again, pasture experiments carried on by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in all sections of the county show that an acre of alfalfa or good clover will save 1149 pounds of corn and 468 pounds of tankage as compared with feeding in dry lot. At the present price of feed this means a net money value of \$45 from an acre of such pasture. Some good forage crops for Penna. conditions are alfalfa, clover, and dwarf Essex rape. In the cooler sections oats and Canada field peas make a good early pasture.

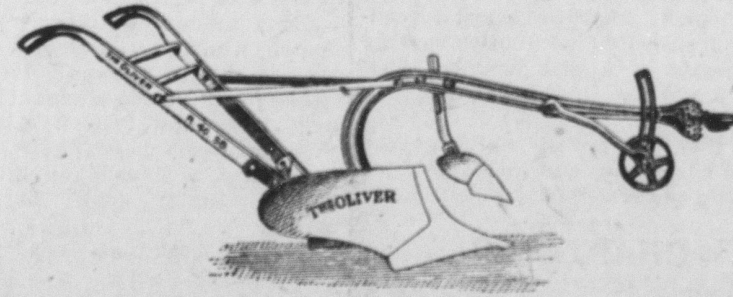

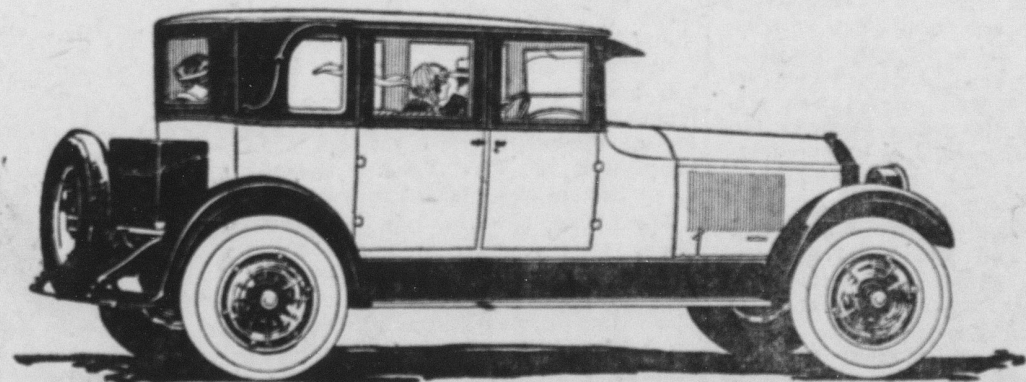

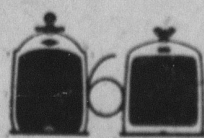
