W. J. SMITH DROPS DEAD ON PAVEMENT.

Had Been in Usual Health and in Good Spirits Throughout Day - Apoplexy the Cause.

The sudden death of William J. Smith, on Monday evening between 5:00 and 6:00 o'clock, was a shock to all his acquaintances, and especially to his father, Mrs. Flora O. Duff, with whom he had lived since a mere boy, and later by adoption became her son - a son as loyal as ever was born. He was mowing a small plot of grass at the side of the house when he was noticed by a neighbor to seat himself on a box covering a pave-wash, and instantly falling to the ground. Thomas A. Hesterman reached his side within a few minutes and had just picked him up when his brother, Thomas L. Smith, came in sight. The two carried the stricken man into the house, where in less than ten minutes he was pronounced dead by Dr. Morrow. It is thought that he died from apoplexy as he fell to the pavement.

Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon and interment made in the family plot in the local cemetery. Rev. S. F. Greenhoe to officiate.

The deceased was a son of Peter now deceased, and Mary J. Smith, of Bellefonte, and was born November 24, 1872, making his age 52 years, 4 months, 27 days. The brothers and sisters surviving are: Mrs. Joseph Wassoy, Mrs. Wilmer H. Smith, Charles W. Luther L. of Bellefonte; Thomas L. Centre Hall; John P. and Mrs. Joseph Ross, Bellefonte.

Mr. Smith was a man of excellent qualities. He was elected to various local offices, and while a member of the town council was also its secretary. He was a member of the Lutheran church since his youth, and filled the office of deacon and secretary of the church council for a number of years. He was also active in Sunday-school work, filling the office of superintendent with much credit for a considerable length of time. He was a man of jovial disposition and consequently companionable, and will be greatly missed in quarters where he frequented daily.

DEATHS.

SPANGLER - After an illness of but four days, James Bernard Spangler died at the home of his only daughter, Mrs. Rebecca Wolf, in Juniata, where he made his home. Mr. Spangler had been in his usual health, but while in the yard surrounding the home amusing his grandchildren, he became ill and was carried to the house. After a brief illness death overtook him on Wednesday of last week, at the age of seventy-eight years and one day. The body was shipped to Centre Hall on Monday, and from here was conveyed to the cemetery at Tusseyville by funeral director E. V. Goodhart. Services were conducted by Rev. Floyd A. Huff, pastor of the Evangelical church, of which denomination the deceased was long a member.

Mr. Spangler was a son of Jacob and Rebecca (Wagner) Spangler, and was born near Potters Mills. His wife, who before marriage was Miss Effie Portney, a daughter of John Portney, died some years ago. There survives the deceased a son, John J. Spangler, of Downers Grove, Ill., and Mrs. Rebecca Wolf, previously named; also, a sister, Mrs. Aaron Rishel, of Hope, Arkansas.

Except for a few years at the close of his life, Mr. Spangler lived in Potter township, where he engaged in farming and dealing in stock. He was highly respected, and his judgment also held in high favor. He was a Democrat in politics and held various local offices which he filled with great credit.

BENNER - After an illness extending over a period of eleven weeks, Philip Benner died on Saturday morning at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Harvey Tressler, in Bellefonte. Interment was made in Shiloh cemetery, Tuesday forenoon, services having been conducted by Rev. Piper and Rev. Shuey of the Methodist church.

Mr. Benner was a grandson of Col. Philip Benner, and son of Henry Benner, and followed farming during the active period of his life. He was aged 81 years, 11 months, 14 days. Mrs. Benner died three years ago. The surviving children are Mrs. Tressler, previously mentioned; John and Clarence Bellefonte; Mrs. Hoy, Shiloh; Mrs. Gray Hastings, Avia.

STOVER - Mrs. Sadie Elizabeth Stover passed away as she fell into her husband's arms in her home at Millheim. She was in her bedroom and suffering from pains, called her husband who was nearby and responded at once, but only in time to catch his wife who was stricken to death. Her age was 52 years, 11 days.

The deceased was the wife of H. G. Stover and was a daughter of the late Jeremiah Snook and had lived in this section the greater part of her life. She is survived by her husband and eleven children as follows: Charles, of Altoona; Gervis, of San Diego, Cal.; Filbert, of Maple Park, Ill.; Paul, of Glen Rock, Wyo.; Mrs. Ruth Walker, of State College; Lefern, in training as a nurse at Lock Haven hospital; Andrew, Rhine, Bessie, Anna Mary and Verdelia, all at home. These brothers and sisters also survive: A. M. Snook and Mrs. Frank Brown, of near Millheim; Mrs. Frank Yonaha, of near Madisonburg; Cord Snook, of Illinois, and Edward J. Snook, of Dayton, N.D.

Interment was made on Thursday last week, the delay having been due to the fact that a son, Paul, could not reach home earlier.

HOUSMAN - Mrs. Emma Jane Housman, wife of J. W. O. Housman, died in Millheim from paralysis. Funeral services were conducted on Saturday

by Rev. Collins E. Hazen of the Methodist church.

Deceased was a daughter of Aaron and Harriet Crouse, and was born in Miles township March 5, 1859, making her age at death 65 years and 1 month. Forty-nine years ago she was united in marriage to J. W. O. Housman. They resided in Smulton until about twenty-five years ago, when they removed to Millheim where they have lived since. She was a member of Millheim Methodist church, a good neighbor and a kind mother.

Surviving her are her husband, one son, F. V. O., of Millheim; two daughters, Mrs. Bertha Winters, of Lemont, and Mrs. Clyde Stover, of Milton; one brother, Calvin Crouse, of Rebersburg, and three grandchildren.

LINGLE - Solomon Lingle died Tuesday morning at his home along Bush Mountain, north of Spring Mills, where he and a son had lived for four years. Death was due to dropsy. His age was 75 years, 3 months and 3 days. Funeral services will be held Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock; interment in Georges Valley. Mrs. Lingle died some years ago, but there survive these children: William F., Sunbury; Mrs. Wm. Roka, Spring Mills; John C., Centre Hall; James, in the west; Charles H., at home; Mrs. James Guleswite, Mrs. Bloomer Weaver, and Clyde C., Spring Mills.

BATEMAN - Mrs. Carrie E. Bateman, wife of David Bateman, of Millheim, Ill., died after a lingering illness. Death was caused by diabetes. Mrs. Bateman was a daughter of John J. Grandy, ex-treasurer of Centre county, and was born at Madisonburg, December 1, 1859. For more than thirty-two years she lived in the vicinity of Eldersburg, Kane county, Pa., together with her husband and two children, all of whom survive to mourn their loss.

KOONS - Harry Koons died at his home at Muncy following a short illness with pneumonia, aged about 66 years. Mr. Koons, who was married to Sadie Adam, of Millheim, for a number of years was in the restaurant business at State College, having been the senior member of the firm of Koons & Hartman. The firm sold out a little more than a year ago and Mr. Koons moved to Muncy and engaged in the hardware business with his brother. His wife and one daughter survive.

BRAUCHT - Stricken with heart disease, Reuben C. Braucht, aged 69, Union county's heaviest man, fell dead in the restaurant at Lewisburg. He was in business many years opposite the railroad station and was widely known among traveling men. He weighed 298 pounds.

Mr. Braucht was a son of the late William Braucht and was born in Penn township, this county, where he grew to manhood. For a number of years he conducted the hotel at Coburn, moving from there to what was then known as the Decker House, at Millheim, and from there to Lewisburg. His wife and two children - Mrs. Bessie Miller and Daniel; also, a brother Wm. W. of Coburn, and two half-brothers, Cloyd and Frank Dinges, both of Coburn, survive.

Funeral services were held at the home in Lewisburg, Thursday afternoon of last week. Interment at Lewisburg.
