**Hold Day for Farmers**—Farmers' Day at State College gets better and better every year. Plan now to attend this year's event on Thursday, June 18, and tell your neighbors about it.

**Grow a Ton of Pork**—Have you picked a litter for the 1925 Ton Litter Club? Last year 58 litters made the ton goal and practically all their owners are in the running with new litters this year because they found that pork could be produced economically at the rate of a ton in six months.

**Raise Better Spuds**—Disease-free potato seed and spraying have been rated as essentials in the production of paying crops of tubers in the Keystone State. This year more growers will follow the improved practices.

**Produce Silage for Cows**—Plan now a field of silage corn and for a 30 in which to preserve it. A less cost in producing milk will follow.

**Learn About Weeds**—Buckhorn is found abundantly in all parts of Pennsylvania. Weed Leaflet No. 1, issued free by the Penna. State College, describes the weed and tells how to control it. 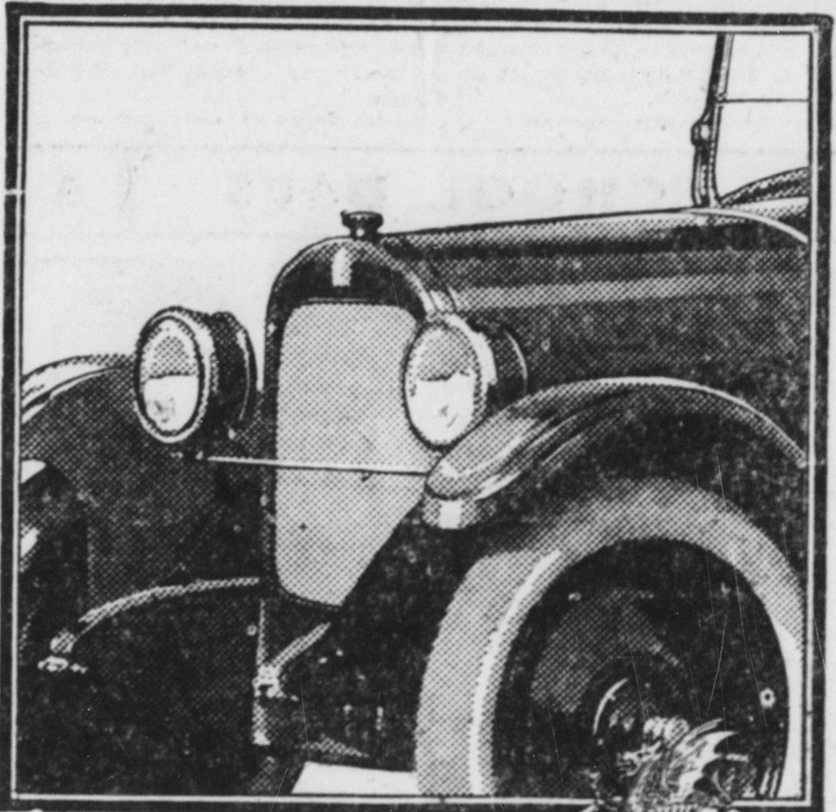
