The County Track and Field Meet at State College, on Saturday, produced a score giving Bellefonte first place and Centre Hall at the foot of the column in Class A.

In Class B, Rebersburg came second with 33 points against Snow Shoe with 58 points. Rebersburg won its spurs through Richard Detwiler, who led in all the runs.

ARMY OF S. S. WORKERS

Centre County Army of Sunday-School Folks Alive, Sincere and Progressive.

Wonder how many of you know that about one out of every three persons in Centre county is a member of the Sunday school. Didn't know there was such an army of Sunday school folks right here in this good old country, did you?

The total number of Sunday school folks in the county, as given by the Pennsylvania State Sabbath School Association, is 14,881, and the population of the county at last census was 44,204. This is a splendid record and yet it does look as if that larger balance, a large proportion of whom, of course are church members, should be in the Sunday schools, for in the State of Pennsylvania, with its population of 8,720,017 there are 2,174,471 Sunday school members, which is a higher average than any other State in the Union.

To train and teach this great Sunday school army in Centre county there is a force of 1312 teachers and officers.

The county has 102 Sunday schools through which the churches of the county last year gained accessions of 311 new members on their active rolls. Last year the Centre county Sunday schools contributed \$556.09 to the work of the State Association.

The State Sunday school Association is the most efficient one in the world and is now and has always been directed by a board of unselfish business men who not only pay their own expenses, but are among its heaviest contributors.

General James A. Beaver, John Wamannaker and H. J. Heinz are three outstanding figures in the history of the Penna. Sunday schools. All three were presidents at various times. However they did not help to organize the association, that occurred back in 1862 in the Civil War days.

Even today this great Sabbath School Association headed by Percy L. Craig, a financier and business man of wide experience, is no less the great and wise leader of his predecessors.
