**FOOT-PRINTS OF BABY.**

**New Law Compels Either Foot or Fingerprint of Baby—Manufacture of Gambling Machines Prohibited.**

Governor Pinchot signed the Aaron bill providing for the finger or foot printing of infants born in State, county, municipal or private hospitals. The act also provides for the recording and filing of these identification marks, and carries a penalty of a fine not exceeding \$100 for violations. Under provisions of the Burke bill signed, the manufacture of gambling machines is prohibited in Pennsylvania. The act makes it "unlawful for any person, partnership association or corporation to make boards or assembly any punch board, drawing card slot machine or any machine used or intended to be used for gambling." Violation of the act provides a penalty of a fine not exceeding \$1,000, or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both.

**Control Insects and Diseases**—Spray early and late to control the aphid on ornamentals. Use nicotine or oil sprays. Also try to burn all the tent caterpillar masses to be found on the place. A torch for this use can be made with a burlap bag dipped in oil and tied to a long pole.

**Sell Broilers on Time**—Do not hold the broilers too long. The supply is now increasing and the price consequently decreasing. Additional weight is put on, therefore, at great expense.

**Do Not Stunt the Calves**—Keep the calves growing. They are the future herd. Size, vigor, and early maturity will thus be realized and profits in dairying increased.

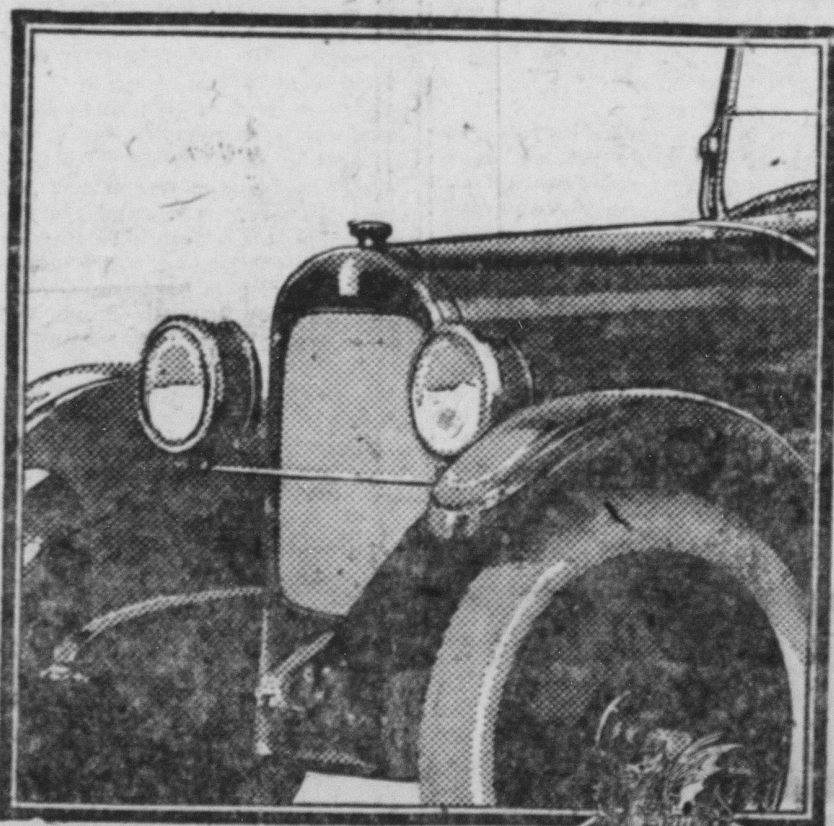

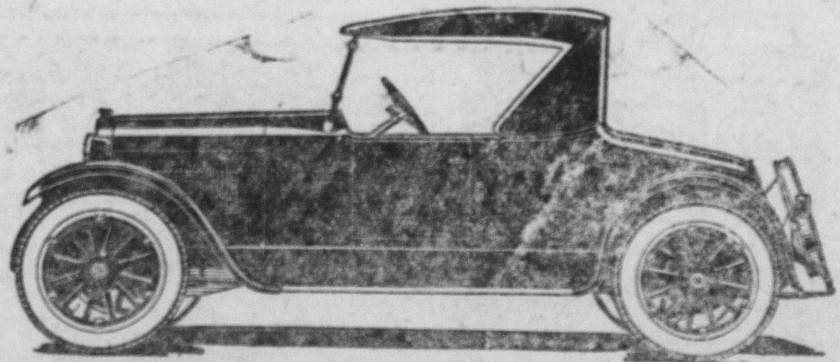
