MAY COURT.

Sessions Opened Monday Morning With Judge Dale on Bench—Many Trivial Cases for Trial.

May sessions term of court convened Monday morning with the Honorable Arthur C. Dale on the bench, and the officers in their respective places. Considerable time was consumed in hearing motions and petitions as presented by the several members of the bar.

The grand jury summoned for this session of court was then called and Howard E. Holtzworth, agent, of Unionville, selected as foreman, after which the grand jury was charged by Judge Dale, and it then retired to the grand jury room to pass upon the several bills of indictment to be presented to it by the district attorney. Such constables as had any return to make to court were then called.

The list of traverse jurors was then called and excuses allowed where necessary. The first case called before the court was Comm. vs. Wilson Walker, charged with statutory crime. Prosecutrix, Vivian Brown. The defendant waived the finding of the grand jury and pleaded guilty and the usual sentence was imposed by the court.

Comm. vs. John Holderman, charged with violation of the liquor laws. Prosecutrix, Charles A. Haxton, State Police. The defendant waived the finding of the grand jury and pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$1 and imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not less than 6 months nor more than one year.

L. E. Kidder vs. George M. Raines, being an action in assumpsit; continued.

H. L. Orr vs. Julia Peters and Edward A. Peters, her husband, being an action in ejectment; continued.

Anna W. Keichline vs. Thomas J. Decker and Colonel G. Decker, trading and doing business as Decker Brothers, being an action in assumpsit; continued, being special to Judge Dale.

On Monday afternoon the first case called was Commonwealth vs. Harry M. Hoy, Prosecutor, P. K. Detwiler, indicted for violation of the liquor laws. The defendant pleaded guilty and threw himself upon the mercy of the court, and sentence was suspended for a period of three years upon the payment of the costs.

Comm. vs. Edward Fye and Foster Quick; indicted for assault and battery and aggravated assault and battery. Prosecutrix Mrs. Thomas Fanning. This prosecution grows out of an altercation between the defendants and Cyrus Schnars, at Moshannon, in Snow Shoe township, September 2nd, last. This case was on trial Monday afternoon and the jury charged on Tuesday morning by the court and verdict of guilty of assault and battery with attempt to maim.

Centre County Sunday Schools to Meet. The Sunday School Association of Centre county will meet in convention session in the Methodist Episcopal Church, Bellefonte, on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 9 and 10.

A splendid program has been arranged including conferences of the various departments of the Sunday school work. These meetings have always proved to be of special interest to the workers and an inspiration to those interested in the Sunday schools of our county.

Two of the speakers who will be heard at the convention are Miss Esther L. Williams, assistant superintendent of the Young People's Division of the State, and Prof. M. Haddon Fisher, director of religious education. This will probably be the last opportunity to hear Prof. Fisher in the Sunday school work as he has accepted the chair in religious education in Gettysburg University.

The sessions on Tuesday will be held in the morning, afternoon and evening, and on Wednesday in the morning.

Wednesday afternoon there will be a special session for the district workers. Try to arrange your affairs so that you can attend. A social feature of the convention will be a banquet served to the delegates on Tuesday evening, probably at the Y. M. C. A.

Buys Telephone Company. Application was made to the Public Service Commission for the purchase by the Bell Company of the entire equipment of the Penn State Telephone Company. The sale of more than a score of smaller companies located in 10 counties is involved in the transaction. The Bell company has agreed to pay \$33,500 for the properties and assume two mortgages amounting to \$461,500.

The Penn State at present maintains service in Blair, Centre, Chester, Clinton, Lancaster, Lebanon, Lycoming, Northumberland, Schuylkill and Union counties. The case has been set for hearing on June 11.

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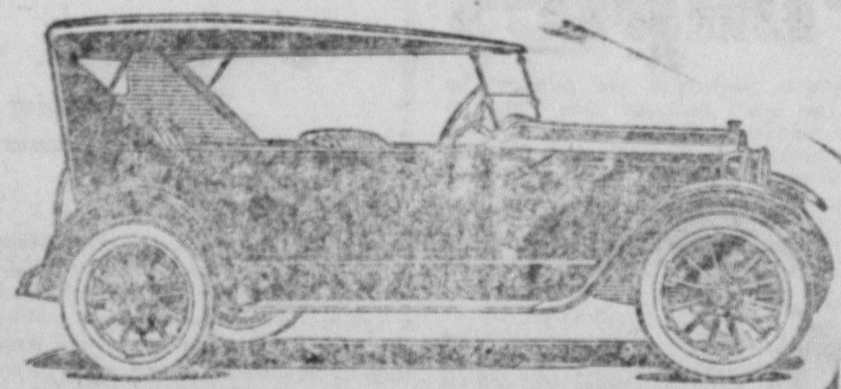
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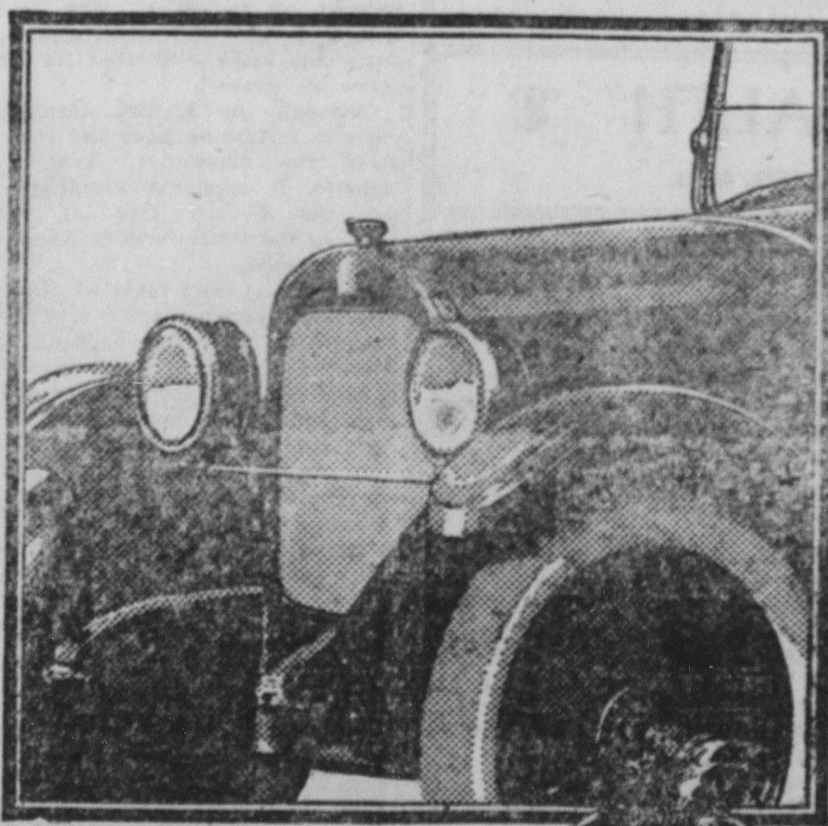
