The site for the proposed range has been leased from Major H. L. Curtin, commanding officer of the Squadron, on his lands in Curtin's Gap. At that place, where the troop held their three-day encampment last summer, will be constructed a range 1,000 yards long, for machine gun target practice and another 500 yards long, for rifle and pistol freing.

250-Mile Auto Race at Altoona.

Four of the world's fastest automobiles, piloted by drivers of international renown, have just been added to the entry list of the June 13 classic at the Altoona Speedway by Fred Duesenberg, widely known sportsman and automotive engineer.

Three drivers of the four-car team have already been named. These are Peter DePaolo, the illustrious nephew of the famous Ralph DePalma, Phil Shaffer, one of the most sensational drivers of the roaring board, and Pete Kries, whose rapid climb to the heights of renown in racing has been one of the remarkable events of the year.

With these three premier pilots selected and announced by the famous sportsman owner of the cars, keen interest has been aroused in racing circles over the man who will be chosen for the fourth car. The wheel of one of these super-speed mounts is one of the most coveted in motordom, as the late Joe Boyer won last year's Indianapolis contest with one of these machines.

Receiving their most rigid test for strength and endurance at the Memorial Day classic at Indianapolis, where the speed average was about 100 miles an hour, the four racing cars will be completely dismantled and overhauled within a few days, then shipped by special express to Altoona ready for the preliminary tuning trials, which will start June 2.

All of the fast entries will pass the qualifying lap tests, conducted by Fred J. Wagner, internationally known starter, at a speed predicted around 130 miles an hour, with the average for the long, 250-mile grind forecast at about 120 miles an hour.

Every inch of the huge mile-and-a-quarter board oval has already been rigidly inspected and the special crews of steel workers are rushing the completion of the heavy steel band at the outer rim, required by the A.A.A. contest board as a further precaution to keep wrecked cars from dashing over the top of the steep curves to crash to the ground, forty feet below.

Rambo in Jail.

The Reporter readers will recall reading an account of a car having been stolen from the streets of Bellefonte, last November, and how Domer S. Ishler, rural mail carrier on Route No. 2 from Centre Hall, and Sheriff Taylor and Policeman Dukeman followed clues that led them into New York where Dennis Rambo was placed under arrest and the Chevrolet car secured. Rambo was brought back to Williamsport where he was wanted on a minor charge and was sentenced to jail. The jail term expired last week, and instead of stepping from prison into freedom, Rambo was faced by an officer with a warrant for stealing the Ishler car. He was brought to Bellefonte, given a hearing before Squire Woodring, and is now in jail awaiting a court trial, not having been able to furnish bail in the sum of \$1500.
