All Ready for the Big 250-Mile Auto Race at Altoona, Saturday.

Peter DePaolo, sensational winner of this year's Indianapolis classic and leader in the battle for 1925 championship honors of the racing world, will make his last appearance in a classic at the famous Altoona speedway on Saturday of this week. In the 250-mile speed dual, departing immediately afterwards for Belgium to compete in the European Grand Prix, and not returning until fall.

Rumored since last week, news of DePaolo's intentions to compete in the greatest of European events became definitely known a few days ago in a telegram from him to speedway officials at Altoona, stating that he would arrive promptly to prepare for the renowned automobile contest at Altoona on Flag Day, but would leave immediately after the race for New York, where his costly eight-cylinder racing machine would be placed upon a trans-Atlantic liner for Belgium, where the renowned road event is to be held on July 5.

DePaolo's announcement has caused an uproar in racing circles as it means that he will practically abdicate the speed championship crown for the year, already almost assured to him, as his departure will mean his absence from the opening of the new Baltimore-Washington track at Laurel, Md., on July 11. Under the rigid rules of the contest board of the American Automobile Association, all five leaders in championship standing absolutely must appear at every one of the board track classics and at Indianapolis.

No details have yet been available, but DePaolo, who is given the odds to win at Altoona next Saturday afternoon in the 250-mile grind against the fastest cars and greatest drivers of the world, is expected to announce his complete plans today upon arrival with his car and corps of personal mechanics.

JOHN SMITH GIVES HOME FOR BOYS.

Mason Provides Gift of \$250,000 Structure With \$200,000 Endowment.

The John Smith Memorial Home for Boys was formally added to the Masonic Home group at Elizabethtown, on Thursday, when the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania accepted the largest individual gift in the history of the craft.

Grand Master Samuel M. Goodyear, of Carlisle, acting for the Master Masons of Pennsylvania, accepted it, and Mr. Smith, the donor, personally saw his dream become a reality.

The home for boys represents the largest single gift of a living Master Mason to organized charity of the craft. John Smith gave \$250,000 for its erection and an additional \$200,000 as an endowment for its upkeep.

The home is a beautiful three-story structure of Holmesburg granite, trimmed with Indiana limestone. It is situated on the hill that faces the main line of the Pennsylvania Railroad and presents an imposing appearance to travelers. It is the first building along the road leading to the park-like Masonic grounds.

Throughout, the building is furnished in a luxurious manner. Hardwood floors, covered with heavy plush rugs, furniture, including deep-cushioned chairs and comfortable lounges, all finished in fumed oak, give the place a distinctly home-like atmosphere.

The porch opens into a great lobby, furnished for lounging purposes and heated by a large open fireplace. A tall grandfather's clock ticks away the hours.

On the first floor is a private suite which has been set aside for the donor during his visits to the 65 boys who soon will occupy the place. Besides this, on the first floor, are three bedrooms and showerbaths. In the basement is a large gymnasium, locker-rooms, showerbaths and manual training rooms. On the second floor are bedrooms, counselor's apartments, a sewing room, isolation room and lounge. The third floor is devoted exclusively to 14 bedrooms.
