William F. Keller, rural mail carrier on Route 1 from Centre Hall, is finishing his vacation before the new postal fiscal year closes, June 30th. Harry C. Reish is running as a substitute.

A large field of corn on the Old Fort farm, tenanted by Paul Bradford, indicates careful preparation and later good cultivation. The corn is also well advanced, probably a bit further than any in the neighborhood.

Rev. Joseph S. Speer, D. D., pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Coshocton, Ohio, has been called by the First Presbyterian church of Tyone at a salary of \$4,200 a year, free use of the parsonage and one month's vacation each year.

Only fair crops of apples, peaches and pears are now expected in the United States this year. Frosts in late May reduced prospects in many scattered sections. The condition of apples on June 1 was nearly 10 per cent. below the usual average on that date.

D. F. Smith visited at Pittsburgh last week and attended the commencement exercises of Carnegie Institution of Technology where his son, Elliot Smith, graduated with a class of 325. He attended the College of Industries and his name was the first of the five honor students.

A large wash-house and wood-shed on the A. C. Keplar farm, one mile west of Pine Grove Mills, were burned Thursday night, endangering the destruction of the mansion and barn. The State College fire company is given the credit for having saved these from the flames.

L. C. Runkle and Mrs. Margaret Runkle, of Shamokin, visited about here for a few days, returning home on Sunday. Mr. Runkle stopped with his brother, James W. Runkle, in Centre Hall and Mrs. Runkle with her sister, Mrs. John H. Runkle, on the farm east of town.

Mrs. Robert E. Snyder and Mrs. Bruce Stahl, of Altoona, were at the home of Mrs. James S. Stahl, mother of the former, for several days, returning home on Tuesday. The Snyders are remodeling the interior of their dwelling house and are also adding a new porch.

Miss Bettie Zerby, daughter of Attorney and Mrs. D. W. Zerby, was awarded first honors upon graduating from the Bellefonte High school. She has been first honor student in every class since entering the Bellefonte schools, where she began her school life. This is a record attained by few young people and it was accomplished without any particular effort on the part of Miss Zerby.

On return home from holding services on his charge, on Sunday, Rev. J. M. Kirkpatrick met with an accident as he was rounding the most northern curve at Tussey Sink. The radius rode broke, making the negotiating of the curve impossible without striking one of the guard posts. The car was damaged to some extent, requiring its being towed to a garage for repairs. So long as the work on the mountain road is confined to the section this side the junction of the "old road," that road, known as the Gregg detour, may be used with reasonable safety. 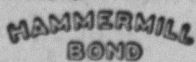

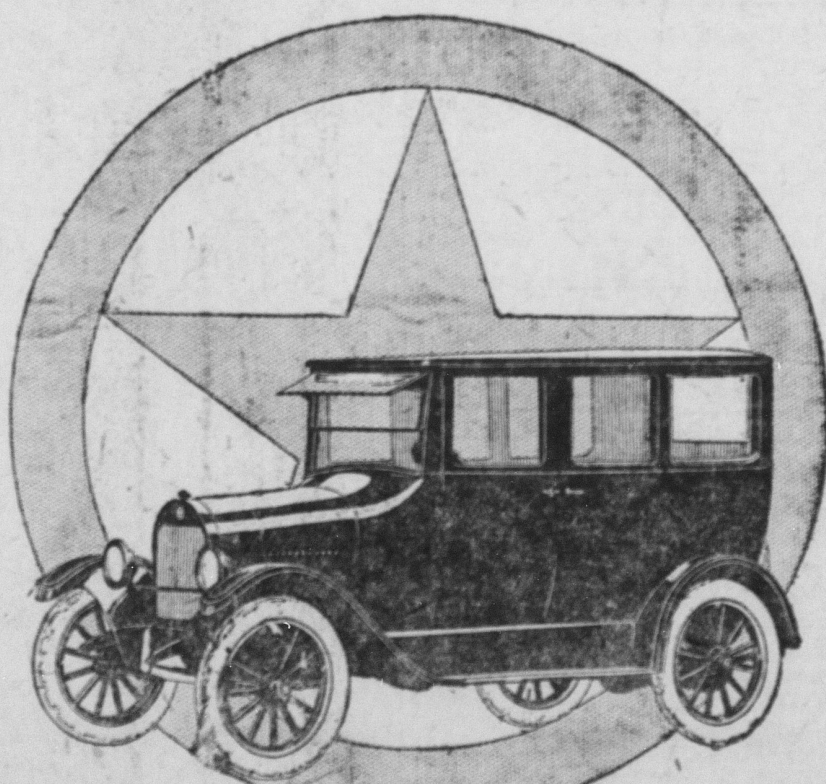

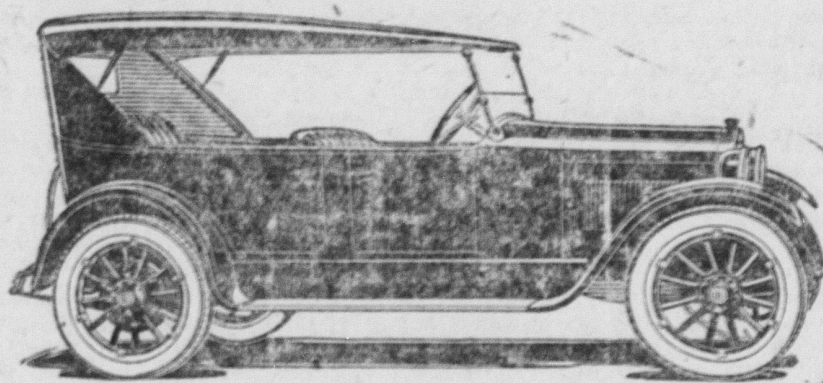
