The board of bishops of the Methodist Church has issued a statement to the members of that organization, in which they ask these people to forego habits of luxurious personal expenditure.

This suggestion will be warmly applauded by the mass of people. It is of course easy for those who have but little money, to suggest to the wealthy that they should omit extravagant expenditure. If one had been very successful in business and had always had money, it might not be so easy to cut off these costly habits.

However, the bishops who have staffed this proposal have a good idea. Not much happiness is gained by the people who spend lavishly and extravagantly on themselves. If they would take the same money and use it in works of kindness and beneficence, the gratitude and friendships they would create would be worth more than any luxuries.

**Does Education Pay?**

It is customary for many taxpayers to growl about school costs. They note that the school appropriation may have doubled in a rather brief period of years, and it seems to them wrong.

It is also customary in most activities, if people want to know whether their money is well expended, to make a study of how it is used. If you buy a house, you give it a thorough examination, before and after purchasing. But many people condemn school expenditure, who have never made any study of how school money is used.

If they want to know whether they get returns for their taxes, they would better visit schools, or converse with teachers attend graduating exercises, and examine the activities of the modern student. If they do these things, they should see that modern young folks are more intelligent, more active, and can accomplish more than those of a previous generation. Complaint about school costs does not usually come from those who know the results.

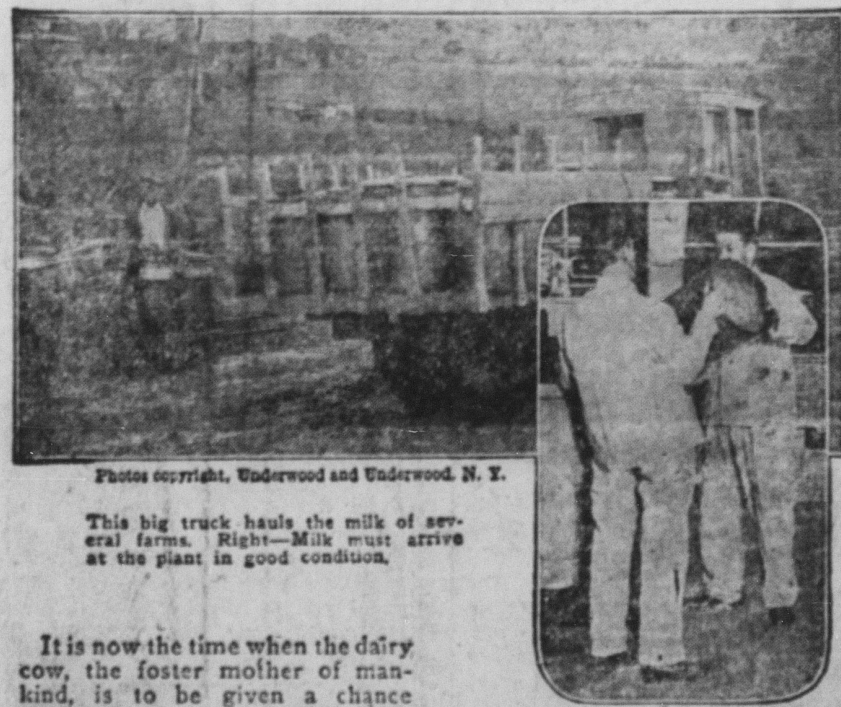
**During July and August Altoona Booster Stores Will Close Every Wednesday at Noon.**

**PREPARING FOR SUMMER MILK**

It is now the time when the dairy cow, the foster mother of mankind, is to be given a chance under natural conditions. New information which has recently been discovered at some of the state agricultural colleges indicates that green feed and sunlight combined make it possible for a cow to build up her system by storing minerals and other body reserves, provided she receives a sufficient supply of good feed.

A heavy milking cow, however, will need feed in addition to pasture if the milk flow is to be maintained. Milking heavily with pasture as the sole source of feed causes the cow to lose weight. This loss of weight should be watched and extra feed given to prevent the cow from becoming thin, which will result in reduced milk production later.

With the coming of the summer season, new and interesting problems present themselves which concern the care of milk. The first warm nights are apt to cause milk to sour unless summer care is practiced. It is important to take precautions which will keep down the number of bacteria and prevent their growth. To do this milk must be produced under clean conditions, be kept in thoroughly cleaned utensils, and be cooled as soon as possible after it comes from the cow.
