Night Air Mail Service.

The night air mail service schedule went into effect yesterday (Wednesday). Planes leave New York City at 1:30 p. m., eastern standard time, and arrive at Bellefonte at 11:30 p. m.; leave Bellefonte at 11:50 p. m. for Cleveland, where they arrive at 2:30 a. m.; leave Cleveland at 2:40 a. m. arrive at Chicago at 5:45 a. m. On the eastern trip the pilot will leave Chicago at 8:30 p. m., central time, and arrive in Bellefonte at 3:30 a. m., eastern standard time. The plane will leave Bellefonte at 3:50 a. m. and arrive at New York at 6 a. m.

The service will be daily except Saturday and Sunday, when night flying will be suspended. The postage rate will be ten cents for night mail, while the day rate will remain at eight cents.

Deer Killed Illegally.

During the forepart of last week a doe-deer was shot and killed on the west end of Egg Hill. The deer was found with its throat cut. It appears the deer was killed at night, for shot were heard from an auto that had passed a farm house at midnight in that section. It is thought that two deer had been killed and that one was carried away, while the other, for some unknown reason was left lie where it had been "stuck."

Regulating Soft Drinks.

Manufacturers of soft drinks must now take out a license which will cost \$50.00 annually.

The manufacture of soft drinks is also regulated in various ways. Saccharine and other preservatives are prohibited. All carbonated beverages and still drinks must contain not less than eight per cent. by weight of pure cane or beet sugar. When artificial flavors or colors are used, the bottle must be distinctly marked, labeled or capped, "artificially colored," "artificially flavored" or "artificially flavored and colored," as the case may be. All cider, fruitages, fruit juices or other similar beverages made in imitation of the natural product, must be distinctly marked, labeled or capped with the word "imitation," followed by the name of the natural product imitated.

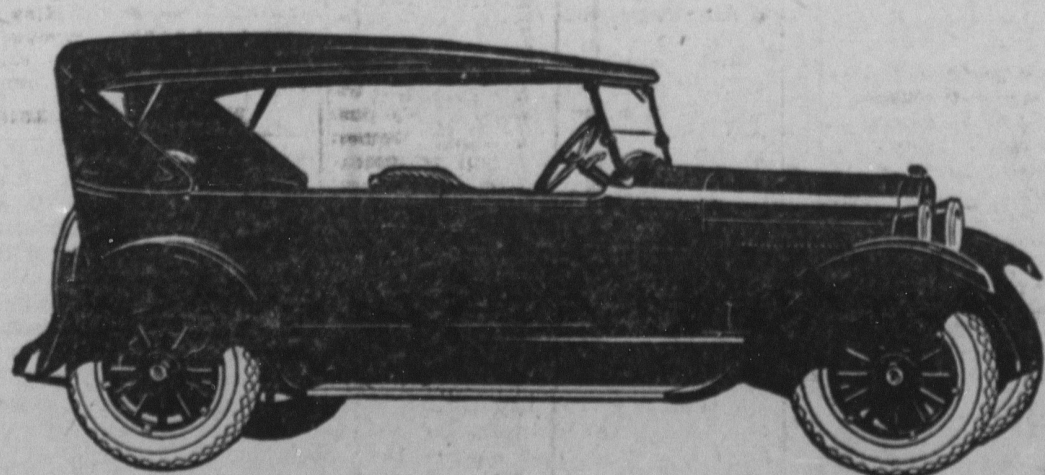
