### Rubber Prices Rising.

The rise in the price of crude rub ber from 17 cents to more than \$1 pound, due to manipulation made pos sible by the British Stevenson act, surprises John Bull himself, and he is saying, "How very extraordinary! Some Britons are also pointing out that the author of the plan of restrict ed production in the East Indies, when questioned in Parliament as to the possible effect of his plan, replied that if artifically high prices prevailed Government sales could be made for the purpose of meeting the unscrup ulous speculators on their own ground and for the further purpose of stabilization of prices, so as to return a fair profit to the plantations. And still prices continue to soar. The American consumers are indignant, and even the Englishman is raising his voice in protest against such a device to interfere with natural economic laws.
