PRICES CUT BY DODGE BROS.
Reduction is Made Possible By Constantly Increasing Production.
Announcement of a reduction in the prices of Dodge Brothers Motor Vehicles, both passenger and commercial, effective Monday, August 17, has been received by W. R. Hosterman, local dealer.
New list prices, f. o. b. Detroit, are as follows:

The price of the roadster, \$855, and that of the Chassis, \$730, remain unchanged.
"The new prices come at a time when Dodge Brothers product has reached the highest peak of mechanical perfection in its history," declares Mr. Hosterman. "In an attempt to supply public demand factory production has been stepped up since the first of this year from 990 cars a day to over 1,100 and now Dodge Brothers are pushing as rapidly as possible an eight million dollar expansion program to give them buildings and machinery for a production of 1,500 cars a day.
