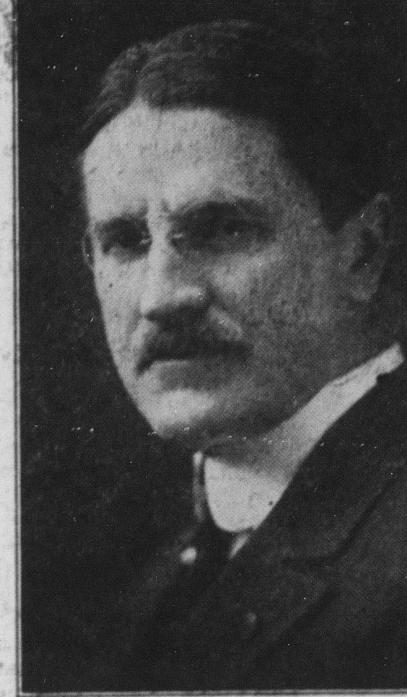
Cow Sale, Sept. 10th.
