Start Bee Year HAD FEW COMFORTS **IN EARLY CHURCHES**

Colonial Worshipers Made Little of Cold.

Eating together after the church services was a very common practice in thinly settled regions during Colonial days and it affoded a good opportunity for the gratification of the social instinct.

To Sheldon church in South Carolina there came seldom less than sixty or seventy carriages, but a neighbor planter was accustomed to entertain the whole assembly. Those of higher social position he invited to his own table, while common folk were provided for by his overseer at the planter's expense.

At great Quaker meetings a similar unstinted hospitality was dispensed by the wealthier Friends. In New England care was taken at first that every family should live so near to the meeting house that people could attend church without straining the fiber of the Fourth commandment. But when the common lands came to be more and more divided, and farms and out-hamlets were settled, people had to travel farther.

In the winter time the people from distance spent the time between the two services by the fireside in the kitchen of the parsonage house, or in that of some neighbor who heaped up wood against the great back log to cheer the worshipers when they came chilled to the marrow from the frosty air of the meeting house.

The custom of building churches without appliances for warming them was very general, especially in the colonies north of Pennsylvania, and was no doubt brought from Europe; one may yet sit through service in fireless churches in Holland, Switzerland and elsewhere on the Continent. In a climate so severe as that of

New England it must have added much to the grizzly rigor of the religious observances. Judge Sewall records in his diary on a certain Sunday in January, 1686, when Boston harbor was covered with ice:

"This day is so cold that the sacramental bread is frozen pretty hard and rattles sadly as broken into the

Though in most places, before the invention of stoves, no one ever dreamed of warming the building, yet measures were sometimes taken to mitigate the cold; the first church in Lynn, for example, was made to descend to low eaves on the side exposed to the northwest wind, and the floor

sunk below the ground. In New York in 1714 servants are described as carrying foot stoves to church for the use of their masters Eighteenth century. In one Quaker meeting in Pennsylvania it was provided in 1699 that a greater. fire should be kept in an upper room for such as are weak through sickness, or age, or disease, to warm at, and come down again modestly."

Proper Time to Prepare for Next Year's Crop and

Supply of Stores.

With New Queen

Strong colonies of bees produce the bigger crops of better honey, according to V. G. Milum, apiarist at the Wisconsin College of Agriculture, He suggests that this is the proper time to prepare for next year's honey crop.

The first step in this march to success, according to Mr. Milum, is to see that every colony is supplied with a vigorous Italian queen immediately. This young queen may be purchased from a reliable queen breeder or may be reared by some method in the aplary. A young queen, Milum points out, will produce a strong colony of young vigorous bees which will winter successfully and still be young and vigorous in the spring, provided they are given proper winter and spring protection and plenty of stores.

Saves Winter Stores.

Milum maintains that the successful beekeeper is the one who saves the first surplus of stores for winter feeding and spring development of brood rearing. In addition it saves a lot of work in extraction of this surplus, but especially it insures the colony against starvation in winter and during unfavorable spfing weather.

Another suggestion of Milum is that with the honey flow now coming to a close, all hives should be inspected to see that they are bee-tight, except the entrance, in order to prevent robbing. He warns against leaving honey exposed when examining colonies if any manipulations are necessary. Once robbing is started in a bee yard, it is practically impossible to do any work with the bees.

Don't Remove Frames.

In connection with the extraction of the honey crop Milum advises that frames should not be removed for extraction until they are well capped over, or not until after a week or more following the close of the honey flow, depending upon the locality and the type of weather conditions. Unripe honey will granulate readily and fermentation will cause all kinds of trouble and inconvenience besides giving an unmarketable product.

With the approach of honey harvesting time, Milum suggests that an inventory be taken of labels and containers. Attractive labels and containers aid in the sale of the product. A quality product is always more valuable: therefore beekeepers are urged to prepare their , honey carefully.

High Quality Seed

Profitable to Use

The farmer of today, knowing that his grain is graded at the elevator and that the higher it will grade the better the price, is paying more attention to the quality of his seed than ever before. He knows that he cannot produce high-grade grain from low-grade seed and is willing to pay the price.

One of the difficulties in raising pure seed is the fact that plants of the grass family, to which corn and the small grains belong, produce pollen so profusely that it is extremely difficult to keep the various strains from crossing. This is particularly noticeable in corn where two varieties of different coloring grow in adjoining fields. Cobs showing kernels of different color are

In order to keep strains pure they must be grown in fields widely separated from fields of other varieties. As hay fever sufferers know, this fertilizing dust from the grain plants is carried for great distances by the wind, making the pure seed grower's

task a difficult one. Pure bred seed naturally is higher in price than lower grades of seed but the product is correspondingly heavier and higher in grade. The grower of fine strains of grain seed usually plants his fields to smaller acreage than the grower of grain for the general market and must exercise much greater care to keep it from contact with other fields. He must surround these fields with some other crops that cannot in any way interfere in the pollination of the seed which he is growing to sell to the farmer who demands the best quality for his acres.

Plan for More Poultry

and Production of Eggs Should farmers plan to increase their poultry and egg production in the future?


The success of such a procedure is very doubtful, according to F. A. Gougler, director of the poultry and egg marketing department of the Illinois Agricultural association.





Determine Age of Sheep

by Development of Teeth At fourteen to eighteen months of age, depending upon breed and rapidity with which the animal has been developed, the middle pair of incisors are replaced by the permanent teeth. These have a much broader cutting edge than the lamb teeth. In a little less than 12 months later the adjointeeth; and in successively shorter placed. Some highly fed animals will at thirty-six or thirty-eight months of age and practically all individuals have the "full mouth" before they are four years old.

All of the permanent teeth have a broad cutting edge when they first appear, compared with the milk teeth. As the sheep grow older the teeth are worn back and hence become narrower. This rate of wearing depends upon the character of grazing upon which the sheep must depend. Western sheep sometimes wear the teeth almost to the gums by six years of age. Again, there is a difference in breeds. The Merinos are longer lived than the English breeds; and a Merino at eight or nine years under like care will show no older month than a Down or Longwool at six.

Ground Corncobs Have

Definite Feeding Value Chemists' analyses indicate that corncobs and oat straw contain about the same amount of food material. Many practical farmers who have looked on oat straw as having but little feeding value have felt that corncobs were even more worthless. Now, however, the Minnesota station finds that ground corncobs are worth considerably more than straw. They have been experimenting with corn and cob meal and have found that it gave somewhat better results than shelled corn. Then they wondered how it would be to substitute finely ground oat straw for the corncobs and so they mixed straw. cornmeal with finely ground straw. This did not do nearly so well as the corncob meal. Next they wondered what results would be obtained if the cornmeal and the ground cobs were fed separately. It was discovered that when the corn and cobs were fed separately that just as good results were obtained. This seemed to prove that ground suncobs have a definite feed-

ing value. These Minnesota experiments are not sufficiently extensive to be at all conclusive. Nevertheless they suggest that corncobs probably have a feeding value much greater than most farmers have thought.

that we now have 37,000,000 pounds of dressed poultry in cold storage as compared with 23,000,000 at this time last year, or an increase of 14,000,000 pounds.' Thus we find a large carryover facing us in the future.

"On considering the press egg marketing situation, we find that there is an increase of 116,000 more cases of eggs in cold storage than reported at this date last year and our export in eggs has decreased as much as 450,000 cases. The reduction in our egg export is partially due to the fact that European countries, who furnished an outlet for our surplus poultry products in the past, are now getting to the point in production where they can supply their own needs. "Reports from Midwestern states

indicate an increase in production this year resulting from the favorable spring season and it is doubtful if the consumption of poultry and eggs will show any great increase in the future."

Feed for Dry Cow

After the cow is dry, the feed should depend largely upon her condition. If she is poor in flesh the feed should be abundant enough so that she will be in reasonably good flesh at the time of calving. If she is in fairly good flesh then little more than a maintenance ration is necessary. If good pasture is available it will be all that is necessary for dry cows. However, if the pastures are poor some additional roughage should be supplied.
