CONDO.—Mrs. Priscilla Jane Condo, formerly of Centre Hall, widow of the late M. M. Condo, died at 1:50 Sunday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Thos. L. Curry, of Old Stanton. She was 74 years, 6 months and 12 days of age. She is survived by the following children: George W. Condo, of Greensburg; Mrs. A. F. Moyer and Clyde F. Condo, of Vandergrift; Mrs. Thos. L. Curry, of Old Stanton, and Mrs. Chas. E. Price, of Johnstown. Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:30 P. M. from the home of her son, George Condo, 706 Foster St., Greensburg, and were in charge of Rev. Maxwell of the First Reformed church of Vandergrift, assisted by Rev. L. E. Blair of the First Reformed church of Greensburg.

McCLINTOCK.—Mortimer McClintock, aged 75 years, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. T. McKague, 327 W. Bald Eagle St., Lock Haven, Friday morning of a complication of diseases.

Mr. McClintock was a native of Centre county, having been born at Pottery Mills, and was a son of John McClintock. He located in Lock Haven fourteen years ago, working for the New York and Pennsylvania company there until retired.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. McKague, with whom he made his home; two sons, Thomas, of Lock Haven and Weldon B. of Waterford, N. Y., and by one sister, Mrs. Thomas Worry, and one brother, Alexander McClintock, both of Yeagertown. The funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at the McKague home, the Rev. Edward Crumbling, pastor of the First Evangelical church officiating. Interment at Highland cemetery, Lock Haven.

HOLLIS.—Hon. Joseph Hollis, of Yeagertown, aged 62 years, dropped dead at his home on Saturday morning. He represented Mifflin county in the legislature in 1922-23. By occupation he was a lumberman. A wife, five sons and a daughter survive him. One of the sons is William E. Hollis, district attorney of Clinton county.

DEVINEY.—John Deviney, a former resident of Reedsville, died at the home of his brother, William Deviney, LeMars, Iowa, aged 78 years, 10 months, and 22 days. He was a Civil War veteran and while attending the State reunion of war veterans at Mason City last summer contracted a severe cold, causing an illness from which he never fully recovered, and finally resulted in his death from throat and glandular trouble and kidney disease.

Mr. Deviney was born in Mifflin county, the eldest son of James and Mary (Marshall) Deviney, being a member of a family that traced its ancestry back to the Revolutionary days. He is survived by two brothers, William Deviney, of LeMars, and Calvin C. Deviney, of Montgomery, Pa. Two brothers, Joseph and James Deviney, preceded him in death. On January 1, 1884, he was united in marriage to Miss Rachel Swabb, a daughter of the late John Swabb, whose death occurred 15 years ago.

After the war he followed the trade of blacksmithing at Reedsville for many years, until five years ago when he went to LeMars to reside.

Two Killed at Lime Works.

When 300 feet of trestle collapsed at the American Lime and Stone Company's works at Bellefonte, on Monday, George Letterman, of Milesburg, was instantly killed, and Russell King, of Bellefonte, was so badly injured that he died in the hospital on Tuesday. Jacob Letterman, was also badly hurt, but will recover. King was the engineer and the Lettermans were brakemen on the stone train that went down.
