GOD SAVE THE COMMONWEALTH. I, E. E. Taylor, High Sheriff of the County of Centre, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the County aforesaid that an election will be held in the said County of Centre on the FIRST TUESDAY IN NOVEMBER, 1925 being the

shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or this State, or of any city or incorporated district whether a commissioned officer or otherwise a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, executive or Judiciary Department of this State, or of the United States or of any city or incorporated district and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the senate or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district is, by law, incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of any such elections, shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that of an election officer.

SAMPLE BALLOT

To vote a straight party ticket, mark a cross [X] in the square, in the first column, opposite the name of the party of your choice. A cross mark in the square opposite the name of any candidate indicates a vote for that candidate. To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write or paste his or her name in the blank space provided for that purpose. This shall count as a vote either with or without the cross mark. To vote for an individual candidate of another party, after making a mark in the party square, mark a cross [X] opposite his or her name. For an office where more than one candidate is to be elected, the voter, after marking in the party square, may divide his or her vote by marking a cross [X] to the right of each candidate for whom he or she desires to vote.

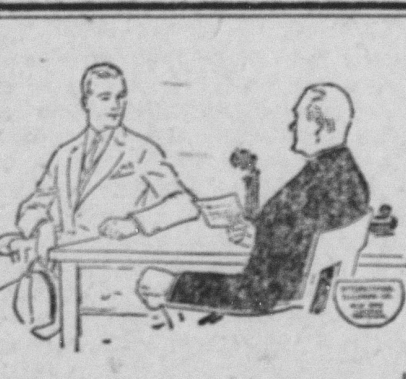
