

LOCAL AND PERSONAL.

William H. Keller, who has been very critically ill during the past week, continues about the same. He is entirely helpless.

Forty-seven head of the choicest livestock in the herds of State College will enter the show rings of the International Live Stock Exposition at Chicago, Saturday.

Frederic Moore, student in Dickinson College, Carlisle, spent Sunday at his home in Centre Hall. He represented his college at a Y. M. C. A. conference at State College the latter part of last week.

The body of Mrs. Taylor, mother of Sheriff E. R. Taylor, arrived in Bellefonte on Wednesday from Detroit, Michigan, where the death occurred at the home of a daughter. Sheriff Taylor had gone to his mother's bedside some days previous to her death.

Saturday morning, Mrs. James Harshbarger, of near Bellefonte, had the misfortune to fall down a flight of steps at her home and break the bone in one of her arms. Mrs. George Searson, of Centre Hall, was with her for a few days assisting in performing household duties.

There remains but a trifle over three hundred feet of the concrete pavement over Nittany Mountain to be poured, and the Reitz Brothers declare every means possible will be resorted to to accomplish this bit of work so that the road may be opened to the public in completed form after the twenty-one day seasoning period has passed. The last pouring was done on Sunday. The frozen condition of the ground has since prevented pouring. The grading has been completed to the brick road.

Mrs. Anna Hemphill, who more than a week ago suffered a paralytic stroke while at the home of Mrs. Spangler, a friend in Philadelphia, is improving. A clot of blood had formed on the brain, and the right side had become paralyzed. The attending physician announced that the clot had been pretty well cleared away. Mrs. Hemphill's brother, William Lawyer, of Elgin, Missouri, arrived in Philadelphia on Sunday, and should Mrs. Hemphill recover sufficiently she will be taken back to Missouri with him. It is almost four weeks since Mrs. Hemphill left Centre Hall.

LAD KILLED BY AUTO.

Five-Year-Old Son of William Kern, of Snow Shoe, Darts in Front of Car Near Home—Driver Is Exonerated.

William Kern, the five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Kern, of Snow Shoe, was instantly killed Monday evening on the highway one-fourth mile west of Snow Shoe, when he was run down by an auto driven by George R. Haynes, of Philipsburg.

Haynes, who is a brakeman on the Snow Shoe and Bellefonte railroad, was returning from work. Seven small boys were playing along the road and at the coroner's inquest Monday night several of them testified that they had gone to the side of the road to let the car pass, when suddenly the little Kern boy darted directly in front of it, and was hit. His skull was fractured as he was thrown violently to the concrete pavement. Haynes took the lad to his home and called a physician, who stated that death had been instantaneous.

The coroner's inquest exonerated Mr. Haynes, the jury returning a verdict that death was due to an unavoidable accident. The child is survived by his parents, and one brother, who witnessed the accident. The funeral will be held today.

Children's Division Institute.

The Centre County Sabbath School Association has arranged a children's division institute to be held Saturday, December 5th, in the Presbyterian Chapel, Bellefonte. There will be two sessions, beginning at 2 P. M. and 7 P. M.

This institute is for the district superintendents of the children's division and their committees, departmental superintendents and teachers in the children's departments of the Sunday schools.

A practical, helpful program has been arranged and every school in Centre county should send at least one teacher in this department to this institute.

The institute will be under the direction of Miss Besse A. Miles, county superintendent of the children's division.

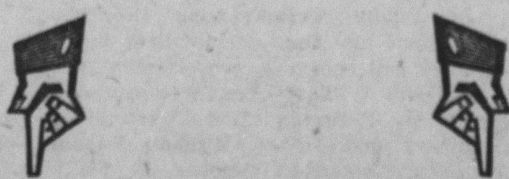

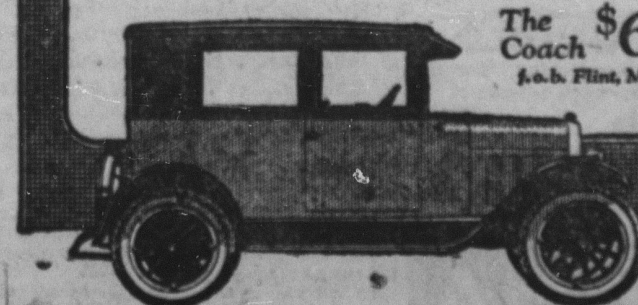
