Horse Supply Is on the Decline

Good Animals Weighing 1,400 Pounds and Up Are Needed on Farms.

Economists at the South Dakota State college urge farmers to look ahead to the time when they will need younger work animals and to produce the draft type of horses that are in good demand. A few years ago the production of horses was one of the principal branches of the live-stock industry. Feed was cheap, climate was fine, and soil suitable for excellent underpinning. All kinds of horses ranging from the small Indian pony to the big heavy draft horse were raised in South Dakota and the surplus found its way, at good prices, to the Eastern and South-eastern markets. Parent stock of the very best breeding and individuality was purchased regardless of prices and brought into the state to improve the quality of horses.

Supplanted by Automobile. The need for light horses on the average general or diversified farm has been filled to a large degree by the automobile. Furthermore, the production and development of these types of horses is becoming a highly specialized industry. The danger of injury to colts, which are full of life and energy, is much greater than with the draft-bred colts or mules. The development of light colts so as to command a profitable price on the market, also requires skill possessed by comparatively few men.

On the other hand, it is quite likely that good horses, weighing 1,400 pounds and up, will be needed to do our farm work and some of the work in other industries for years to come. A report of the United States Department of Agriculture for May 1, 1925, indicates that only 11.4 per cent of the horses on the farms of crop reporters over the United States are under four years of age, while 43 per cent are under ten years of age. This report also shows that the present rate of colt production in the Middle West, of which in so far as horse production is concerned, South Dakota may be considered a part, is not enough to maintain the present number of horses. Yet, in past years, the Middle West has been the source of horse and mule replacements for both the Southern and Eastern states.

Must Pay Higher Price. Under such conditions the farmer cannot reasonably expect to buy horses five years from now at as low a price as he can buy them today. The number of colts born on the farms in South Dakota during the spring of 1925 indicates that many farmers are already looking ahead to the time when younger horses will be needed.

Give Colts Proper Care and Attention in Fall

Colts should be looking good at this time of the year and it is highly important that they be given the proper care and attention after weaning to keep them growing well during the fall and winter months. Before colts are weaned they should have become accustomed to eating grain, since grain feeding is necessary to prevent a check in growth after weaning. When pastures get short, plenty of alfalfa hay and other roughage should be fed together with enough grain to keep the colts gaining all through the winter. Colts well cared for during the winter season will continue to make good growth on pasture next season. A well-developed young horse has a much higher value than one that is stunted.

Prices for Sheep and Lambs

It seems to be reasonably certain that there will be but few, if any, more sheep and lambs slaughtered this fall than a year ago. This, together with the fact that pork and beef prices for the next few months will remain well above those of last year for the corresponding period, leads to the belief that fat sheep and lamb prices this coming winter will compare favorably with those of the corresponding period last year.

Tobacco Useful for Control of Worms

Kentucky Experiment Station Recommends It.

The poultry division of the Kentucky experiment station recommends the tobacco tea treatment for controlling intestinal worms in poultry. For each 100 hens or 200 pullets of frying size, chop up a pound of tobacco stems. Allow these stems to soak from six to eight hours by pouring just enough hot water over them to cover them. Then drain off the juice and squeeze the stems to get as much of the nicotine as possible. This juice should be used in mixing six to eight pounds of mash.

The birds to be treated should be starved at least ten to twelve hours before feeding the mash wet with the tobacco juice. It is also advisable to keep the birds confined to the house the day after they are treated. Feed the moist mash about noon, and two or three hours later add epsom salts to the drinking water, a pound to 100 hens or 200 fryers. Make sure the next morning that the birds leave the house at dawn so that they will not pick up any of the worms voided during the night. Thoroughly clean the house and burn all litter taken out.

The tobacco tea treatment should not be used on pullets which are just coming into good production or on hens which are laying heavily, as the starving tends to disturb egg production and may be followed with a partial molt.

For a heavy laying flock or for growing stock, it is frequently desirable to use tobacco powder in the dry mash. The powder should contain from 1 to 2 per cent nicotine. Two pounds of the powder should be added to each 100 pounds of growing or laying mash, and continued in the mash for three or four weeks, and then repeated several weeks later if necessary.

Vaccines Used as Cures for Diseases in Hogs

When a definite diagnosis of swine plague or hemorrhagic septicaemia can be made and it is known that cholera or some other disease condition is not present in the herd, the use of hemorrhagic septicaemia aggrassin is recommended, advise veterinarians at the Kansas State Agricultural college. This is especially true if only a few hogs are starting the disease.

Where the herd has been infected for some days, a preliminary dose of bacterin may be advisable as the aggrassin is usually a little slower in producing resistance to disease, although its effects are more lasting. The resistance conferred by bacterin may last from a few weeks to a few months, depending upon the number of doses given and the antigenic properties contained in the bacterin.

FARM NOTES

Cane should be matured or frosted before put in a silo.

The most important single factor in the care of asparagus is maintenance of the soil fertility.

Cane sown broadcast for hay makes the best quality of hay when cut at about the stage when the first head blooms.

The market value of any fruit is greatly increased if the fruit is properly packed in a substantial and attractive package.

Parsnips, parsley, oyster plant and horseradish are not easily injured by freezing. They may be left right where they grew in the garden.

Do not pile apples under the trees. Sort them as soon as picked and store in a cool place off the ground. Handle carefully so as not to bruise the fruit.

A self-feeder with shelled corn in one compartment and tankage in another compartment is probably the most satisfactory and economical method of finishing the spring pig.

Efficiency Expert Qualifies for Job
