TANKAGE AS A HOG FEED.

Indiana Experiment Station Finds Tankage Profitable Even Though Fed With Best of Feeds and Pastures.

We can often secure valuable information from our neighbors which has been one of the objects of the swine tours that have been taken by the swine breeders in Pennsylvania out of the State during the past few years and prompts us to pass on a summary of some of the results of the swine experiments at the Purdue Experiment Station in the State of Indiana, which were recently given out to the farmers of that State at a meeting at the Experiment Station, states R. C. Blaney, County Agent.

They find that it pays to feed tankage on pastures where they are receiving corn or other grain even when the pasture is a good growth of either clover or alfalfa. When fed tankage a group of hogs on experiment that required one-half acre of pasture required from three-fourths to one acre of the same kind of pasture to make the same gains when tankage was not supplied.

It was shown that soybeans replaced tankage on clover and alfalfa pasture for fattening hogs if minerals were supplied in liberal quantities. The rate of gain for the hogs receiving tankage was an average of 1.65 pounds per day and the gain for the hogs receiving the same ration of corn and mineral with soybeans replacing the tankage was 1.52 or practically the same, and the cost of the gain was \$5.75 where soybeans were fed and \$6.04 where tankage was fed. This indicates that where soybeans can be grown successfully or purchased at a low price compared to the price of tankage, it will pay to replace at least a part of the tankage in the ration provided minerals are included in the ration, and the hogs are on clover or alfalfa pasture.

Where tankage was fed to hogs on pasture the rate of gain on the fattening hogs was 33 per cent faster than where it was not fed, making the profit greater and getting the hogs ready for the early fall market which was higher than the later market on which the pigs receiving no tankage were sold. For a five year period the early market averaged \$1.15 higher than the late market. This increase in price and the saving due to the shorter feeding period, the elimination of risk of some of the hogs dying before getting them to market and the quicker turnover on the money invested made from the feeding of tankage extremely profitable. When minerals were fed with corn or clover or alfalfa pasture the rate of gain was increased 11.5 per cent on an average over a five-year period. The results showed clearly that a full feed of corn, tankage or soybeans on clover or alfalfa pasture does not supply all the minerals needed by growing and fattening pigs.

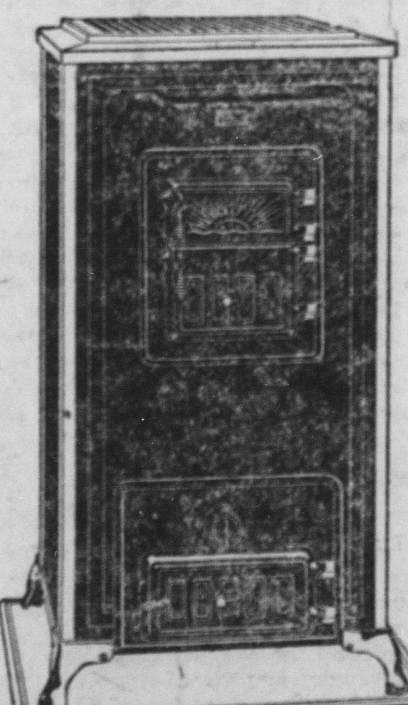

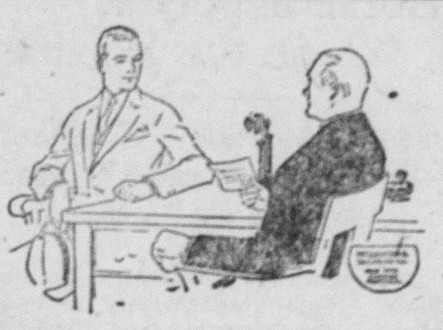

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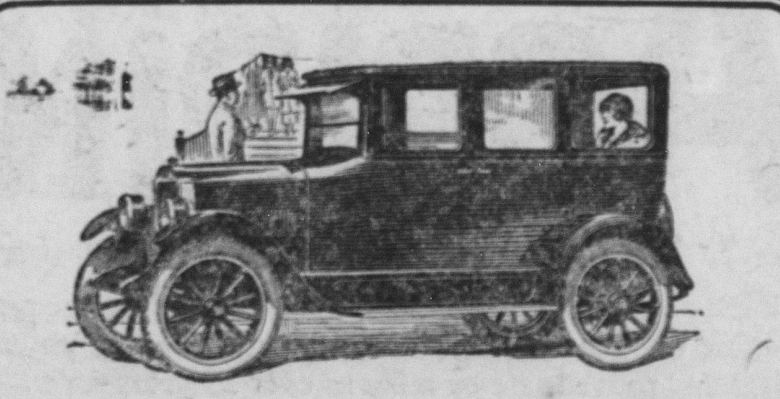
