**The Public Schools.**

The school law provides that the daily session of school shall open at 9:00 A. M. and close at 4:00 P. M. with an intermission of one hour at noon and an intermission of fifteen minutes in the forenoon and in the afternoon, unless otherwise determined.

The school law specifically states that the Fourth of July and Christmas day shall be observed as holidays and the board of school directors in any district also authority to determine other holidays on which schools may be closed all or part of the day.

The special days observed by the schools are:

1. Arbor and bird days.
2. Frances Willard Day.
3. Other days of historic, religious or local significance, such as Thanksgiving, Washington's birthday, Lincoln's birthday, Election Day, Good Friday.

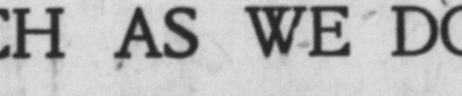

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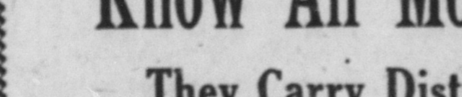

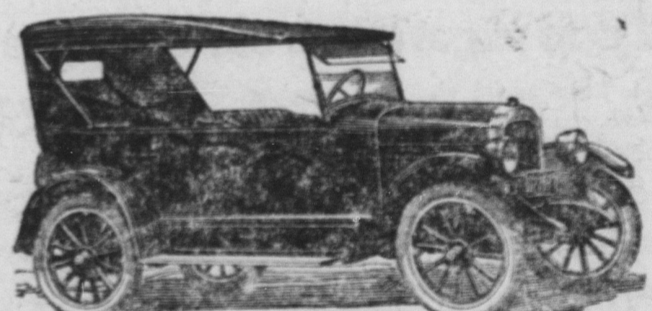
