DEATHS

MOYER.—Franklin Moyer, long a resident of Potter township and of late year of Centre Hall, died at the home of his son, Archie A. Moyer, just before noon on Monday. He had complained of not feeling well, and after lying down for a while sat in his chair, where he remained until life passed out. Interment will be made this (Thursday) morning, the body being laid to rest by the side of his wife who died seven years ago. Services will be conducted by Rev. S. F. Greenlow, pastor of the Lutheran church and the pastor of the deceased. Mr. Moyer was born in Clinton county, having been a son—one of ten children—of George and Catharine (Wagner) Moyer. His wife was Miss Sarah Alexander and as noted above is deceased. The children surviving are Lizzie, wife of Wm. F. McKinney, of Potters Mills; Mrs. Able Long, of Burns; Allen F. Vandergrift; Ella, wife of Bruce Runkle, near Centre Hall, and Archie A. Four sisters also survive the deceased, as follows: Mrs. Charles Wolf, Aaronburg; Mrs. Nathaniel Boob, Millheim; Mrs. John Kemmerer, Loganton, and Mrs. John Page, Jersey Shore. Mr. Moyer was a farmer by occupation, having tilled various farms in Potter township, and from the Kennedy farm came to Centre Hall. The deceased had attained his eighty-first year on July 30th.
AUMAN.—Nevin A. Auman, all his life a resident of Millheim and for a number of years a prominent business man in that place, died suddenly early Friday morning at his home. Mr. Auman had not been in the best of health for some time and for a month or more suffered from the effects of an injury received to one of his legs while on the side-lines watching a football game. He had pretty well recovered from this, and on the evening prior to his death was sitting at his home with Mrs. Auman, when he was suddenly stricken with apoplexy, death following a few hours later. Interment was made at Millheim on Monday forenoon, after services were conducted according to the usages of the Reformed church of which denomination Mr. Auman was a member. Mr. Auman was a son of the late William and Amelia Auman, and was aged sixty-nine years. He is survived by a wife, whose maiden name was Miss Ollie Geary, sister of Frank P. Geary, of Centre Hall, but no children. A sister, Mrs. Josephine Hardenburg, and Lloyd Auman, a brother, both of Millheim, also survive the deceased. For many years Mr. Auman conducted a grocery store and ice cream parlor in Millheim, retiring only a few years ago, but retaining the valuable property in which the store and residence are located.
LIMBERT.—Harvey Limbert, a resident of Rebersburg, was taken to the Geisinger Memorial Hospital, Danville, a few weeks ago suffering from paralysis of the esophagus, and died there on Monday morning. The body was conveyed to his home on that day by undertaker F. V. Goodhart, and interment will be made this (Thursday) afternoon at Rebersburg, the funeral services being in charge of Rev. W. A. McClellan, of the Reformed church of which denomination the deceased was a member. Mr. Limbert during his active life was engaged in farming. He was a son of the late Jackson Limbert and was born at Madisonburg. His wife, now deceased, was Miss Anna Greninger. There survive the deceased two sons—Roy W. Limbert, a student at Lancaster preparing for the Reformed ministry, and K. G. Limbert, living on a farm in Lancaster county; also two brothers, namely, Alfred Limbert, Flat Rock, Ohio, and William Limbert, of Madisonburg. The deceased was aged sixty-eight years.
JORDAN.—Mrs. Alice Jordan, widow of John Jordan, died in Lewisport on Wednesday night of last week from pneumonia, aged seventy-three years. Interment was made in the Lutheran cemetery on Sunday afternoon. The Jordan family prior to moving to Mifflin county lived in Potter township, where Mr. Jordan engaged in farming. He lost his life by being hit by a railroad train twenty-five years ago. The deceased was the second wife of Mr. Jordan, he having married sisters. She was, before marriage, Miss Alice Frear, a daughter of Jacob Frear, and was reared in Boalsburg. There survive her five children, namely, Charles, Christina, Mary and John, all married.
ODNDORF.—Isaac Odndorf, a prominent farmer of Haines township, died at his home near Woodward, on Saturday. He was aged about seventy years. Interment will be made today (Thursday). The deceased is survived by a wife, a daughter of Henry Stover, and several children.

DECEMBER COURT.

Last Quarterly Session for 1925 Opened Monday With Judge Dale on Bench.

December sessions of Court convened on Monday morning with the honorable Arthur C. Dale on the Bench and the officers in their respective places.
A large portion of the forenoon was taken up in hearing motions and petitions as presented by the several members of the bar.
The grand jury was then called and Charles W. Bartley, a farmer of Marion township, was selected as foreman, after which the Court charged the grand jury and they retired to the grand jury room to pass upon the several bills of indictment that will be laid before it by the district attorney.
The traverse jury was then called and absentees noted and excuses entered, after which the list of constables of the several wards, boroughs and townships was called and those who had anything to report made their report to the Court.
The case of the Comm. vs. George Mothersbaugh, which was continued at last court, was again continued on the ground of a doctor's certificate showing the illness of the defendant.
The following civil cases were disposed of:
John C. Marks vs. Penn Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Chester county, being an action in assumpsit, continued, being special to Judge Dale.
Toner A. Hugg vs. Toner A. Hugg, individually and as administrator of the estate of Emaline Hugg, late of Milesburg borough, deceased, and Mrs. Anna Witherite, of Tyrone, and Mrs. Jennie Davidson, Mrs. Walter Smith and Harry Hugg. Being an action to revive the lien of a judgment, continued, as it is special to Judge Dale.
The first case called for trial was Clarence J. Speicher and Lloyd E. Shoap, trading and doing business under the firm name of Official Football Schedule Printing Agency, vs. Hugh B. Wagner, being an action in assumpsit. The testimony in this case was closed on Monday evening and argued on Tuesday morning.
Roy M. Bowman, a member of the Lebanon county Bar, was in attendance at Court on Monday.
College Students Home for Vacation.
Young men and women from this county who are attending colleges and schools throughout the east will begin to return to their homes the latter part of this week for the holidays. Christmas vacations at the colleges, averaging about two weeks' duration, allow many of the students to get home early enough to earn something towards their college expenses through working at odd jobs during the pre-Christmas rush.
For most communities throughout the State, the Pennsylvania State College returns a high percentage of the college student quota. The Penn State vacation starts on Friday afternoon and most of the students will arrive home that evening or on Saturday. Their holiday recess closes on Tuesday, January 5.
One group of about fifty Penn State students have voluntarily given up the pleasure of Christmas vacation this year. They are members of the Theban club who will undertake the biggest road tour in the club's history with their musical comedy show. They start in Bellefonte on December 21, and will travel for two weeks, showing in Wilkes-Barre, Philadelphia, New York City, Binghamton, N. Y., Scranton, Pittsburgh, Erie, Meadville, Butler and Greensburg.

METHODIST HOME, TYRONE, BUYS MORE LAND

Home for Aged Secures Adjoining Property to Present Home, Enabling Admission of Several From Waiting List.
A valuable property on Lincoln avenue, between Ninth and Tenth Sts., Tyrone, has been purchased by the trustees of the Methodist Home for the aged. It abuts on the present property of the home and gives the home a solid plot of ground between Washington and Lincoln avenues. The property, which cost \$5,000, contains a good dwelling house which as soon as possession is given will be used as a residence for employees of the home, releasing a number of rooms in the present building and permitting the admission as guests of a number of applicants now on the waiting list.
This will not, however, clear the waiting list and the trustees plan for a further addition in a few years. The purchase of this property was made possible by a gift of \$5,000 from a Central Pennsylvania Methodist, the balance of the necessary amount being collected by Rev. C. W. Karns, D. D., assigned to that work by conference authorities.
