Give Birds Fresh Air-Keep the poultry houses well ventilated to prevent colds. Ventilation means dry ouses. Do not entirely close the ventilators on cold nights as this permits moisture to gather in the house with resulting colds. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Grow Trees and Shrubs-Now is the time to start collecting hardwood cuttings. The intense cold of February sometimes injures the new wood. Cut in January, this wood is almost certain still to be unharmed. Almost all vines and most shrubs can be grown from cuttings.
