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

THE CONTROL OF RAW

**FOODS** 

PRIMITIVE man picked his fruit from the tree and ate it as fast as he picked it. The fish he ate were those he caught himself. The animal food was of his own killing and preparing. There was little danger of his food becoming infected or contaminated, for it passed through no hands but his

So modern problems of food control are of comparatively recent origin, says Dr. Herman N. Bundesen, health commissioner of Chicago. In a recent article in the Journal of the American Medical Association, he discussed the best methods of regulating raw foods so that they may reach the purchaser and consumer in sound and wholesome condition

Milk is probably our commonest raw food. It is also probably the most perfect natural food. Unfortunately, it is just as well fitted for sustaining other forms of life and so is an ideal medium in which to grow the germs of typhoid, diphtheria, tuberculosis and scarlet fever. These germs may get into raw milk from the cow that gives the milk, from the farm hand who milks the cow, from the pail or can in which the milk is stored or from the milkman who delivers the milk. The danger of contaminated raw milk is now so generally recognized that in practically all large cities today milk ordinances require that all milk sold must be partially cooked or pasteurized before being sold. Even after it is pasteurized it may be infected before it is consumed. So city milk ordinances should include provisions for bottling, capping and handling and housewives should be taught that all pans, crocks, bottles and jars in which milk is kept should also be kept clean.

That this danger is very real is shown by Professor Rosenau of Harvard, who has collected evidence of 317 epidemics of typhoid, 125 of scarlet fever and 51 of diphtheria since 1907. There have probably been many more cases in country districts that were never recognized or reported.

Cream, butter and ice cream, being milk products, are also equally open to suspicion. Oysters eaten raw may carry typhoid, as was shown by the typhold epidemic last winter in New York, Chicago and Washington, Fruits and vegetables may carry typhoid especially leafy vegetables such as cabbage, celery, lettuce and water cress. This infection may come from the earth in which they are grown, ground or from dust or handling in transportation. All fruits and vegetawashed preferably in hot water before

There are two common forms of inflammation of the kidneys or nephritis as the doctor calls them, Both of these are the result of infection somewhere else in the body and affecting other parts of the body as well as the kidneys. #### Eggs Carry Well in Good Packing

Series of Tests Made to Show Efficiency Under Commercial Conditions.

(Prepared by the United States Department

The economy of careful packing of eggs has been demonstrated in a series efficiency under commercial conditions of eight different methods of packing eggs in cases and two methods of buffing the cases in the cars. The eggs carried through to market with comparatively little damage.

The tests were made recently under the auspices of the interrelations committee, representing egg case and filler manufacturers, shippers, railway and express companies and receivers in co-operation with the bureau of agricultural economics, United States Department of Agriculture.

Different Methods. The eight different methods of packing used were as follows:

1. Standard case, standard fillers and flats, four excelsior pads. 2. Standard case, standard fillers

and flats, six excelsior pads, 3. Cut down three-eighths inch less in depth than standard, standard fillers and flats, four excelsior pads, 4. Standard case, standard flats, fill-

ers one-eighth inch deeper than standard, four excelsior pads. 5. Standard case, standard fillers and flats, cup flats top and bottom. 6. Standard case, standard fillers,

eup flats throughout. 7. Cut down case, standard fillers, embossed flats, four excelsior pads. 8. Standard case, standard fillers, embessed flats, cup flats top and bot-

Six different shipments of two cars each were made. The different shipments moved from Enid, Okla., to Boston; from Wichita, Kans., to East St. Louis: from Hutchinson, Kans., to East St. Louis; from Clarinda, Iowa, planting. to Chicago; from Columbus, Neb., to Washington, and from Marion, Ind., to Jersey City. Each car was loaded with an equal number of the eight different packs, one car in each shipment being braced with wood and the other buffed with baled straw or hay. The eggs were packed in the cases by employees of Swift & Co. at their plants located ut the various shipping points.

Two cases of each pack, in each car, were thoroughly candled and inspected to determine the number of damaged eggs at shipping point and again at destination in order to ascertain the damage occurring in transit. #### Coniferous Trees Good as Farm Crop

Have Assured Market for Lumber or Pulpwood.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Profitable crops may be obtained from the poorer areas on many farms by planting coniferous trees. Even in small sizes the conifers may be sold at a profit as Christmas trees, and in of shipments to test the comparative the large sizes they have an assured market for lumber or pulpwood. As a class they promise earlier and larger money returns to the farmer than other kinds of trees. Conffers are also very effective as windbreaks. And although they grow best on rich, deep, well-drained soils, some species of conifers-the pines in particular-will ordinarily take hold better than hardwoods on poor solls such as worn-out fields or pastures, sandy areas, cutover woodlands and areas with shallow soil.

Information on how to obtain trees for planting, as well as complete instructions for producing home-grown seedlings, for planting them, and for caring for the plantation, are given in Farmers' Bulletin 1453, just issued by the Department of Agriculture under the title, "Growing and Planting Trees on the Farm."

lighteen states listed in the bulletin now operate nurseries or provide in some other way for distributing tree seedlings for planting. These states usually furnish the seedlings at cost or free. Good planting stock can also be obtained from commercial dealers.

With the possible exception of two or three species of hardwoods, nearly twice as much saw-log timber can be taken from a fully stocked merchantable stand of conifers as from a similar stand of hardwoods. Conifers can be matured in greater numbers per acre, and their straight, unbranched trunks yield more saw logs. In general, therefore, for timber production conifers are the best choice for farm

#### Fine Time to Overhaul

Farm Machines in Winter

During late winter and early March is a fine time to overhaul farm machinery, or at least send for the needed repairs and put them in place on warm days, also to oil and repair the harness. At this time, plans for spring and summer work are gone over in detail and everything made as handy as possible for the rush of spring. Extra nuts, washers and bolts for the machines, and extra snaps, straps, etc., for the harness are bought and laid in a handy place.

In fact, everything is done that can use our brains, it is surprising to see how much can be done during the winter season that will pay big dividends later on in the lessening of breakdowns, and in their quick repair if they happen. Remember that the farmer makes more money with the right use of his brains than he does with the use of his hands, or at least it is a 50-50 proposition. Endeavor to improve your brains during the winter and do some regular reading and study.

#### Good Staying Qualities

Needed by Swine Grower

Andrew Boss, vice director of the Minnesota experiment station, told an audience of farmers on Swine Feeders' day, University farm, St. Paul, Minn., that the important thing after getting into the hog business is to stay in and develop a plan that suits the individual farm. He gave five rules for successful hog raising:

Provide suitable quarters for feeding and sleeping.

Lay out a system of lots and fencing fields to give clean fresh forage for brood sows and litters through the summer.

Make use of all dairy products and farm waste possible and provide an abundance of water at all times. Arrange the farm so that shotes can be turned into the corn fields and fat-

Provide for a surplus of feed so that stock hogs can be fed out at any time that the market looks especially prom-
