Mercury stood at four below zero sometime during Tuesday night. That was the coldest experienced during the present winter.

Joe Prichard, a prominent Phillipsburg business man and a former Burgess of that town, who had been seriously ill, has very much improved.

Charles S. Burris, of Williamsport, was in Centre Hall on Tuesday, having come here to attend the funeral of Philip Lester.

William A. Reiber publishes letters of administration on the estate of his father, William Reiber, late of Potter township, deceased, in this issue. The estate of the late Franklin Moyer, of Centre Hall, is also administered on by his son, Archie A. Moyer.

In a \$100,000 fire in Youngstown, Ohio, in which a garage and twenty or more auto cars were burned, a new Moon car belonging to Frank N. Wallace, husband of Elsie Slick, formerly of Centre Hall, was destroyed. Heavy dynamite charges had been planted throughout the garage, plumbing shop, and the apartments. Most of the dynamite charges exploded, but some failed to do so.

Two local lads of Vddy tender age were accused of entering the home of J. Roy Shaeffer, at Old Fort, and taking a revolver and money. One of the boys confessed to having been in the house, entrance having been gained, according to his story, by the use of a key carried by his companion. The other lad stoutly denied all knowledge of the transaction when brought before Squire Brungart for an informal hearing. The boys were severely reprimanded and were instructed to attend school and stay in at nights.

**DEATHS**

**LESTER.**—After an illness, from which he was afflicted for a period of years, similar to shaking palsy, Philip A. Lester died at his home east of Potters Mills, Friday morning. Interment was made Tuesday morning at Spruce town, and services were conducted by Rev. C. E. Hazen, pastor of the Methodist church of which denomination the deceased was an adherent.

Mr. Lester was long a resident of Potter township, having come here from Snyder county. He engaged in lumbering and farming, and had lived in various sections of the township named.

In 1886 he married Miss Clara Burris who survives him, as do also these children: Minnie, Mrs. Charles Mendler, Lloyd and Frank, all of Lewis town; Katie, wife of Adam Smith, of Centre Hall; Mabel, wife of Edwin Musser, on the Lester farm near Potters Mills; Orpha, wife of William Hall, Yeagertown; Marie, wife of Norman Bierly, Rebersburg; and Blaine, at the parental home.

A sister and three brothers also survive the deceased, namely: Mrs. Frank Charles, Laurelton; Samuel, Milroy; Charles, Potters Mills, and Levi, in Illinois.

Mr. Lester was aged 59 years, three months and three days.

**FINKLE.**—After an illness for about one year due to gland trouble and enlargement of the spleen, Mrs. Ada Minerva Finkle passed away at her home at Spring Mills, near where she had been born and reared, on Friday morning. Interment was made in the cemetery at the Holy Cross Lutheran church, on Saturday afternoon. Services were conducted by Rev. S. F. Greenhoe, the deceased having long been a member of the Lutheran congregation of which he was the pastor, and with her husband, who died three years ago, were long most loyal and liberal supporters.

Mrs. Finkle was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah Heckman, of near Spring Mills, both of whom survive her, as do also a brother, Lester Heckman, of Spring Mills, and these children: Rufus R., Millburg; Marion, wife of William Rocky, Altoona; and Miss Madeline, at home. She was aged 54 years, 3 months and 6 days.

**TATE.**—Although ill since last August the death of Andrew J. Tate, at State College, was unexpected when it occurred on Sunday at 11 o'clock A. M., while seated in his familiar chair. He was a painter by trade and was a sufferer from what is commonly called painter's consumption. He was aged about fifty-six years and was a son of Andrew J. Tate, Sr., long a resident of Shiloh district. There survive the deceased his wife, nee Annie Bottorf, daughter of the late Fred Bottorf, and eight or ten children; also, these brothers and sisters: Thomas, Freeport; H. H. George, Homestead; Mrs. E. K. Smith, Missouri; Mrs. Frank Lee, now deceased, was also a sister.

Interment was made at Pine Hill cemetery on Wednesday. Services by Rev. John F. Harkins, of the Lutheran church, pastor of the deceased.

**GRENNINGER.**—Perry P. Grenninger, for many years a justice of the peace at Tyersville, died on Friday, aged fifty-two years. A widow and two daughters, Lela and June, survive. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. W. A. McClellan, of Rebersburg, on Tuesday.

**GROVE.**—Mrs. Leah Bohn Grove, wife of Daniel Grove, died at her home in Boalsburg after an illness of indistinct age. She was born in Potter township, a daughter of William and Lydia Stem Gentzel. Her age was 84 years, 4 months and 11 days. She was married to Daniel Grove on August 9, 1858. The following children survive: Mrs. Alice Collins, of Pittsburg; John Grove, Leah Grove, Frank and Hiram Grove, all of Bellefonte, and Mrs. Lydia Rockey, of Boalsburg. Funeral services were held at the home of her daughter in Boalsburg; interment at Zion.

**ERDLEY.**—Galen Erdley, widely known throughout this section, died at his home in Milton Tuesday of last week, from a complication of diseases which he had been suffering for the past several months. He was aged 71 years.

Mr. Erdley was known to most every one in this part of the state, having conducted eating stands at the Grange Encampment and Fair at Centre Hall, Lewisburg, Milton and Bloomsburg fairs for a great many years.

Besides his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Harry Hiborn, of Milton, and a step-son survive. A son, Walter Erdley, preceded his father to the grave five months ago. Interment was made Friday in the Lewisburg cemetery.
