## HOW TO KEEP WELL

### VALUE OF ANIMAL EXPERIMENTS

THE arguments for and against what is erroneously called "vivisection" have been repeated many times in newspapers and magazines. While most people agree that man has a right to use animals for his own good, there is a small group of people who object, on principle, to any use of animals for increasing our knowledge. These persons are generally sincere and kind hearted. They are not, as a rule, reasonable or consistent, since they wear leather shoes and woolen clothes, eat animal food and use animals for beasts of burden and labor. Nor have I ever heard of an antivivisectionist who objected to exterminating mosquitoes, bedbugs or flies.

Most of these enthusiasts entirely overlook the fact that, leaving human interests entirely out of account, animal experiments have been of great benefit to animals themselves. If they asked the animals they are trying to protect, they would get some valuable ideas.  
When dumb animals are sick and suffering, asked Mr. Baynes, the well-known naturalist and animal lover, what are they to do? When horses have glanders, when cattle have tuberculous, when sheep have anthrax, when hogs have cholera and dogs have rabies and distemper, what can they do about it? They cannot discuss their troubles with each other. The only possible way help can come is through men and women who have studied animal diseases.

The modern scientific methods for treating and preventing animal diseases began with Pasteur, whose experiments on anthrax led him to the discovery of a serum which is used today all over the world to protect sheep from this deadly disease. Similar serums, worked out through experiments on the animals themselves have also been discovered for chicken cholera, hog cholera, and other animal diseases.

This work has now largely been taken over by the United States Department of Agriculture. A recent report states that the loss to the farmers of the country through animal diseases amounted in 1915 to \$212,850,000, and that in the last 30 years the total loss from this cause has been over six billions of dollars. Work of the bureau of animal industries has not only saved a large amount of money but has also prevented an immense amount of suffering among the animals themselves. For instance, the experiments made in developing hog cholera serum cost the lives of 17 hogs. Yet in one year it saved over a million hogs.

So if the animals themselves could express their views, they would be strongly in favor of any experiments by which greater knowledge of any of the diseases from which they suffer could be secured.

### LIGHT AND LIFE

LIGHT is life. Not poetically or sentimentally, but practically and actually. Not only that, but it is probably matter as well.

At the meeting of the American Academy of Science held at Milwaukee recently, Prof. R. A. Millikan, the well known authority on electrons, announced that he had discovered and proven the existence of "cosmic rays" which come to this earth constantly from some outside source and which, as some of his scientific associates said, will probably solve the problem of the existence of matter.

Today, with X-rays, ultra-violet light, wireless rays and all the other discoveries of the last thirty years, we are prepared for almost anything. Yet all this increased knowledge of light has come in a lifetime, crowded into a few years, after long ages during which the human race has groped in darkness.

Man is the only creature that has ever been able to overcome darkness. Every other living thing on earth is dependent on the sun or the moon for light. When these two natural sources of light fail, animals can only wait for the rising of the sun. Primitive man was in the same condition, until he learned to make fire and to use a dry branch for a torch to light up his cave. Then he learned to make a lamp out of the skull of some animal filled with fat and supplied with a rude wick. Later, the lamp was made of clay. More than one thousand years before Christ, Jewish priests made candles to burn before the altars. Probably other early races learned to make candles about the same time.

Gas from coal was first used in 1798. Petroleum, first called rock oil and later kerosene, was not discovered until nearly the middle of the last century. Electricity as a lighting medium was not developed until about 1880. So our present-day lighting methods have all developed in the last hundred years and electricity, the greatest of all, in less than fifty.

Each advance has increased the brilliancy and lowered the cost of lighting. Kerosene lamps are 50 per cent brighter than candles at the same cost. Gas is still brighter and cheaper. Today, the average American household uses 18 times as much light at less than 75 per cent of the cost, as compared to the candle burning days.

### Paris Plans to Have Markets Underground

The city fathers of Paris have hit upon a grandiose scheme to relieve the congestion in the streets, Pierre Van Passen relates in the Atlanta Constitution. They figure that there is still plenty of room underground. Of course the idea is not quite new, for Paris has a perfect subway service. Under an eighth of the area under the city, however, is a great hollowed space. This was once a quarry, but in 1781 and later under Napoleon, immense piles of bones and skeletons were stored there, when cemeteries around the churches were abolished for sanitary reasons. Now certain members of the municipal council advance the idea of sinking city markets into these catacombs. With a lighting system and proper ventilation, it is believed, public markets can be installed here after the bones are taken out once more, a scheme that would allow the destruction of the present central markets, which occupy ground much too valuable for such purposes.
