Not Appreciative of Snow Plows.

When the residents to Main street in Mill Hall, near Lock Haven, awoke the other day to find the streets plowed with snow, they set to work vigorously and shoveled all the drifted whiteness into the middle of the street. Shortly afterward the State Highway Department snow plow came along and cleared the street, throwing the snow back on the sidewalks.

Patience the merchants and householders turned out and again shoveled the snow back off the walks, but late the same day the plows returned with a repetition of the first performance. The problem was solved when a big truck was hired to haul the snow away.

\$80,000 Fire in Tyrone.

Tyrone was visited by a disastrous fire last week, destroying property to the value of \$80,000, in one of the town's business blocks. The flames did not reach the factory plant of the W. E. Hoffman Ice Cream plant, but the offices and their retail store were completely ruined. The second floor of the Hoffman building composed of new and modern apartments, and the Hoffman house adjoining, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. John Hoffman, Jr., and children, were all damaged by fire and water.

The Connor barber shop, in the Scott building, was thoroughly burned out, the fire originating in that place.

The Fred R. Hicks meat shop was considerably damaged, as well as the Helping apartment above.

A second fire originated in the Solomon dry goods store, and spread to the adjoining structures, occupied by the Getz & Dickson Bakery and the Charles U. Getz meat market. For a time the entire business block was threatened, the firemen being greatly hampered by the extreme cold weather.

The Solomon store and stock were completely ruined, they estimating their loss at near \$20,000. The Getz meat market, with valuable new refrigeration counters and fixtures, along with the usual big stock carried at all times, suffered a loss estimated at \$20,000, including the building. The Getz & Dickson bakery suffered the loss of two carloads of flour, machinery and other supplies being completely ruined by water, and their loss will near \$20,000. All parties are fortunately fully covered with insurance.
